

### School for Deaf Open to Public

An "open house" will be held at the new provincial school for the deaf, Ontario St., Milton, on Saturday afternoon, November 16, superintendent D. E. Kennedy announced today.

From 1 to 4 p.m. that afternoon the school will be open to the general public on an informal basis, the superintendent said. Many staff members will be on hand to explain the various facilities the school offers the 184 deaf students from Western Ontario. No group tours are planned, instead officials want the public to come and leave when they can.

Mr. Kennedy reported hundreds had already visited the school in group tours, and he hoped those who did not have a chance to tour the school earlier would be able to attend the open house.

Unfortunately, the children will not be in classrooms that afternoon, so there will be no chance to see a class in operation. The formal opening of the school is being delayed until the minor school building is completed in 1964, he said.
