Businessman G. W. Benton Came to Acton as Small Child

A popular Acton businessman, George W. Benton, age 63, of 69 Mill Street, died Sunday, October 27, at St. Joseph's Hospital, Guelph, after an illness of eight weeks.

Born in England, Mr. Benton came to Acton as a small child with his parents, the late George Benton and Amelia Turner. He was a butcher by trade and established a thriving business on Mill Street before moving to a Queen Street location. He later responded the downtown store, where he was assisted by his wife, until failing health caused him to sell the business a few years ago.

Mr. Benton was a member of St. Joseph's Roman Catholic Church and a member of the Holy Name Society. He was married in 1927 to the former Mary M. Birns, of Arthur.

The funeral was held from Rumble-Shoemaker Funeral Home Wednesday, October 30, to St. Joseph's Church for Requiem High Mass at 10 a.m., with celebrant Rev. V. J. Morgan P.P., Rev. A. Callahan P.P., Rockwood, was present in the sanctuary and Rev. F. X. Birns S.J., officiated at Dublin Cemetery where interment took place. Those who acted as

pallbearers were Len Lovell, Cliff Bradley, Wm. Duval St., Archie Papillon, David Gordon and Henry Deveau.

The deceased is survived by his wife, daughter Helen, and son Willie, and sister Mrs. John Smith (Ethel) also an uncle, Fred Turner, Arthur St., all of Acton, and an aunt Miss Mae Turner of Guelph.

Waterless Dam Causes Dispute

A 10-foot-high dam holding back a foot deep puddle of water while a downstream farmer complained his water rights were blocked, caused repercussions at the Credit Valley Conservation Authority's meeting Thursday in Terra Cotta.

Fred Kainz, who farms on the Sixth Line a mile north of the Terra Cotta park, said his cattle were dying of thirst since his neighbor, Robert Gilpin, threw up the 200-foot-long earth dam this summer.

Unfortunately, the feeder creek has dried up and the dam has

only a 50-yard-wide shallow pool behind it. The Authority detailed Farm Planning and Land Use Chairman Alex MacLaren of Georgetown to investigate. However, local sources expect the dam will be washed out by next spring's floods.

Photography Tips

Close in for Close-Up Shots The best informal pictures of children are often taken when their parents would least expect the situation to yield exceptional snapshot opportunities. Looking at photos of this sort, whether it's an experiment in junior science or merely a favorite pastime, one would sometimes assume that the photography is the work of a professional with special training in posing children at work or play.

But this is not so. Wonderful pictures of children are usually achieved by spending a great deal of time with them. For most parents this is not only easy but vitally inescapable.

To catch those wonderful picture opportunities you must have your camera in the right place at the right time. This will mean that you can take advantage of those situations which in the past may have evoked a vain "Wouldn't that make a cute snapshot?"

When children are engrossed in their juvenile activities move in with the camera as close as you possibly can without amputating an important part of the picture. Let's say that the reason for a picture is entirely concentrated

on a child's face. The child may be sniffing a flower, blowing bubbles or reacting to a new food. The likeliest place for your camera to be is just as close as it is capable of making a sharp picture. With a box-type camera, this distance is around six feet but slip an inexpensive close-up attachment over the lens and the distance shifts to a more desirable three and one-half feet.

Stay Well Back When the picture situation depends upon what the entire child is up to, step back so that you can see the entire child in your viewfinder. If there is any chance that your busy subject might change position, back up an extra foot or two to allow a safety zone.

Snaps of children can be close and sharp and still leave lots of room for improvement. When shooting pictures of children be sure to keep the camera down at their level, even if it means bending, kneeling, stooping, squatting or sprawling.
