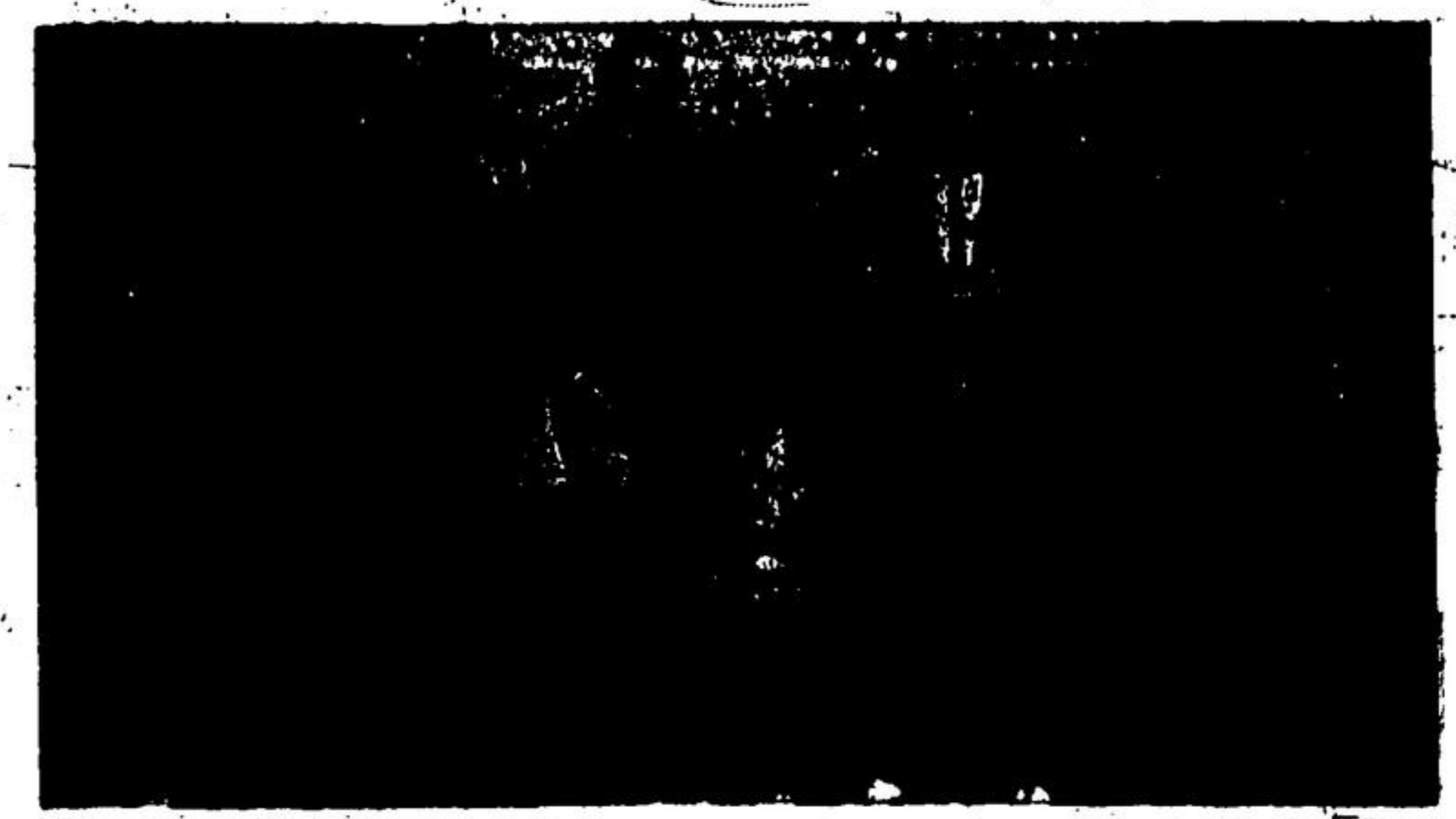
Remembrance Day services were well observed Sunday morning, first at the Cenotaph at 11 a.m. with the Guelph Pipe Band in the lead from the Public School.
