## 28,348 Damage In Oct. Accidents

North Halton O.P.P. investigated 33 accidents during the month of October resulting in property damage estimated at \$28,348. Fifteen persons were injured and three were no deaths.

For the first ten months of the year members of the North Halton detachment have investigated 328 accidents resulting in six deaths, 140 injured and \$149,353 property damage.

One of Harriston's oldest business men, Harry Thomas Frankum passed away suddenly at his home on Thursday, October 24.

He was born in Montreal September 11, 1887, the son of the late Henry James Frankum and Gertrude Butler.

After leaving Montreal he lived in Southampton and then in Acton, where he graduated from high school and served his apprenticeship in A. T. Brown's Drug Store. He lived here 20 years.

In 1912 he graduated from the Toronto College of Pharmacy and came to Harriston in 1914. He has been in the drug business ever since. A few years ago he sold to Mr. C. A. Brown and since then has been semi-retired.

He married Ella Mae Hull of Erin, who remains to mourn his loss, also two daughters, Inez of Toronto; Kathleen of Hanover, three grandchildren and one sister, Lilla of Harriston.

He was laid to rest in Harriston Cemetery on Saturday, October 26. The service was in charge of Rev. J. Lake of Harriston United Church of which Mr. Frankum was an active member.
