Suggest Orchard Spray To Eliminate Pear Blast

Pear blast, a disease very similar to fire blight in both symptoms and action, is present in some Hutton orchards. Where this disease has been serious, consideration should be given to a spray of bordeaux 16-16-100 as soon as the leaves fall. A driving, drenching application should be made to force this copper fungicide up under the bud scales.

Peach leaf curl, which causes leaves to be distorted, thickened and reddish in colour can also be controlled with a fall spray. A choice of fungicides is possible for control. One of ferbam, or bordeaux 8-10-100 or elgetol can be used as soon as all leaves have fallen.

Sprays must be applied on a day when they will dry before freezing. Sprayer tanks, motors and pumps must be drained to protect them from freezing at night and upon completion of the fall spraying operation.

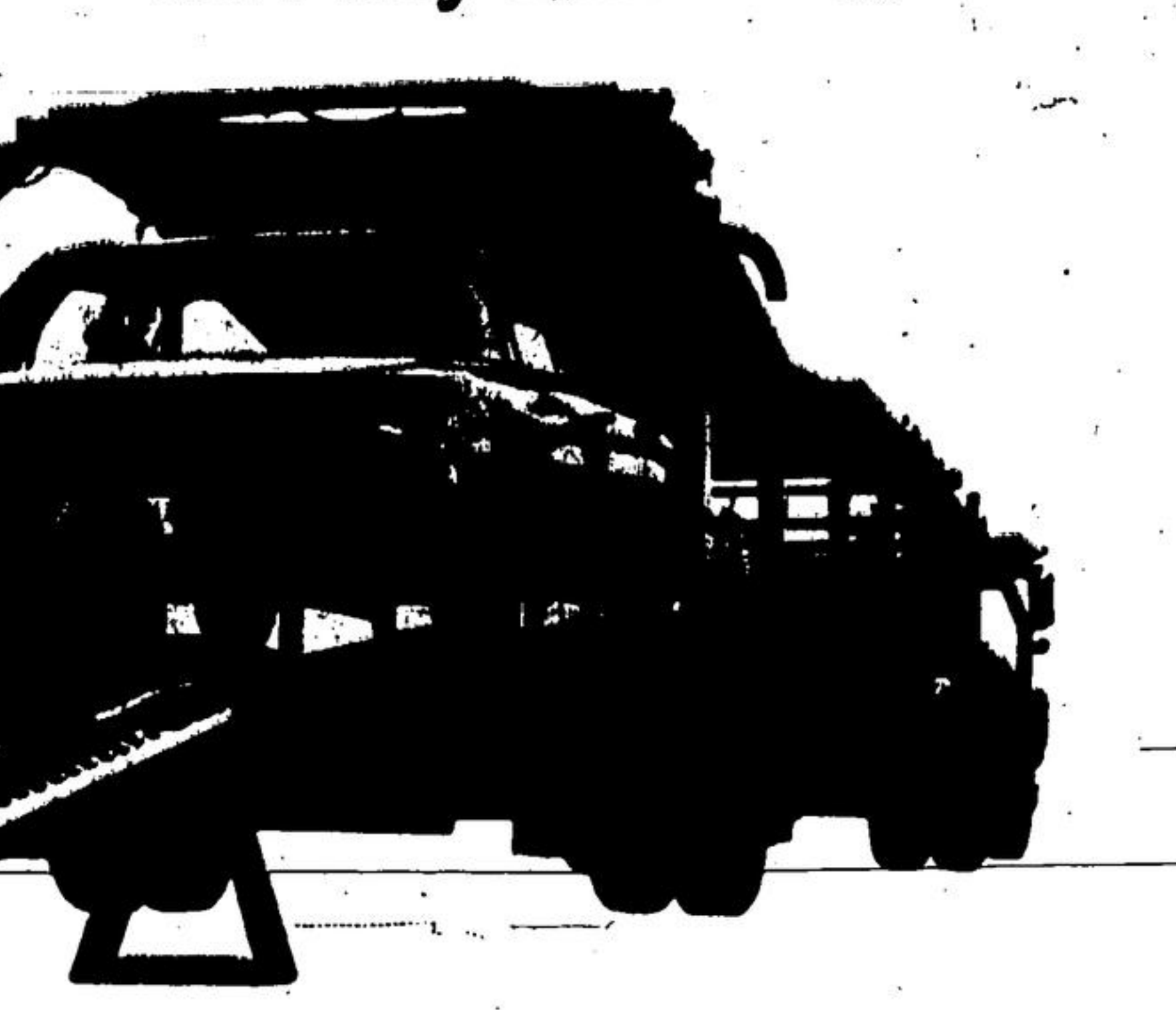
