Both Mr. McGown and Mr. Schriel conducted the Communion service and at intervals Mrs. John Mowat played soft music on the organ. She also played the organ accompaniments for the lovely familiar hymns that were sung.

This is the second Communion service that Mr. McGown has arranged and like the first service, it was a source of great inspiration to the many residents who attended.

Royal's Top Shorthorns Shown By Halton's Bennett, Gardhouse

In a strong Shorthorn show at the Royal Winter Fair, the Scotsdale herd of S. G. Bennett of Georgetown, emerged as winners of both Premier Breeder and Premier Exhibitor awards. In both classes, they were closely followed by the Aberfeldy herd of R. W. Gardhouse, Milton.

Bennett wins included the reserve senior and reserve grand championship with the junior yearling female, Scotsdale Tulip Queen. Scotsdale also drew a red ribbon in the following classes: summer yearling bull, junior beef-calf and mature female.

Aberfeldy Wins
Gardhouse had the senior and grand champion bull, Aberfeldy Deacon, who was also named Supreme Champion of the show. The Gardhouse senior bull call, Aberfeldy Exchequer, was named reserve junior champion bull. Gardhouse's senior heifer calf, Aberfeldy Waterloo Delight, was named reserve junior champion female. Other red ribbons going to Gardhouse were: pair of bulls, get of sire, and three calves.

Also competing strongly were the Polled entries of Grant Campbell, Moffat. His summer yearling, Camson Charly Clipper 3rd, went through to the female junior championship.

This was a particularly strong show; according to the judge, E. J. Cammaert, Royford, Alta. Entries were from five provinces: Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotia, Manitoba and Alberta.

Stewarttown Expansion

An additional five acres will be purchased from H. Reid to add to the site of the Stewarttown School. It was decided at Esqueving School Board meeting last week.

If the water difficulties can be overcome, the Board is considering building a three-room addition at Stewarttown. If clear all-free water cannot be obtained, at least two board members, Mac Sprowl and Mrs. S. Armstrong, would be opposed to any addition at Stewarttown.

Apart from the water problem, Mrs. Armstrong was not too enthused about a Stewarttown addition. She felt the intention in building a school was to keep the children in their own area, rather than transporting them from one end to the other.

In an attempt to discourage vandalism in the schools, corridor lights will be left on, and drapes left open. In addition a directive has gone out to all principals that no money at all is to be kept in the schools.

The report from the principals revealed that Speyside school has an enrolment of 170, Glen Williams 219, Stewarttown 187, Pineview 217, Limehouse 238, Norval 101 and Milton Heights 54.

The possibility of hiring a combined administrator and supervisor for the School Area was suggested in a motion by Mrs. Armstrong and Mr. Sprowl. The motion appointed a three man committee to recommend procedural by-laws, and to inquire about the "supervisor of schools."

No Such Guy
Inspector McDowell pointed out there is no such position as "supervisor of schools" but a Superintending Principal would cover the need. He has to be a principal of a school in the area and there has to be a vice principal in the same school.

"It seems like a good idea if we can get one" commented Chairman R. J. Cunningham for a committee of Shirley Armstrong, Mac Sprowl and Bill Lawson will investigate the possibility.
