### Warden's Salary \$3,500 Councillors \$20 Meeting

A by-law passed by Halton County Council last week sets the 1964 Warden's salary at \$3,500 plus mileage. At the same meeting, the council approved a new by-law setting their own salaries at \$20 per council and committee meeting, plus mileage.

In each case, the member can claim one-third of his salary as expenses on income tax returns. Mileage is computed at 10 cents a mile for the first 7,000 miles,

eight cents for the next 7,000 and seven cents for mileage in excess of 14,000 miles.

The councillors' \$20 fee is a per diem payment for council or committee meetings of other functions and meetings authorized by council.

Deputy-Reeve William Conter, Mississauga, said the committee's study showed the Warden received an average of \$3,600 for the past five years when Wardens

were paid for expenses plus \$20 per meeting.

**"Public Image"**  
The only opponent to the salary for the Warden was Deputy-Reeve William Hunter, George town, who claimed under this system the Warden would not have to attend any meetings, yet could still claim the salary. Deputy-Reeve Gordon Gallagher, of Burlington, countered this by saying the Warden the incentive to get out and attend every committee meeting and other functions to get enough money to pay for the time he devotes to the job.

Only Deputy-Reeve Hunter was opposed, as the by-law was approved.

Reeve H. H. Hinton of Acton attempted to get council to pay a straight 10 cents per mile travel allowance, instead of the sliding scale outlined in the by-law to ease the work load on the county staff who must compute each councillor's mileage. However, on a 7-4 vote the mileage allowance was left on the sliding scale of 10, 8 and 7 cents.

A pair of skates advertised in the Free Press classified ads were sold by five o'clock — and calls kept coming.

### Refute High School Proposal

Esqueping Council has turned a temporary "thumbs down" on Milton District High School's proposal for a \$601,000 addition to the Williams Ave. school. Councilors did not complain of the township's share of the cost, but hesitated to approve an addition before high school boundaries in North Halton are completely settled.

The township's share of the addition will be 23 per cent of the municipalities' share after grants have reduced the \$601,000.

An auditor's statement showed a projected surplus on township books this year, of \$1303. Councilors noted a surplus from previous years stood at \$1802.

and there is a reserve for working funds of \$31,647.
