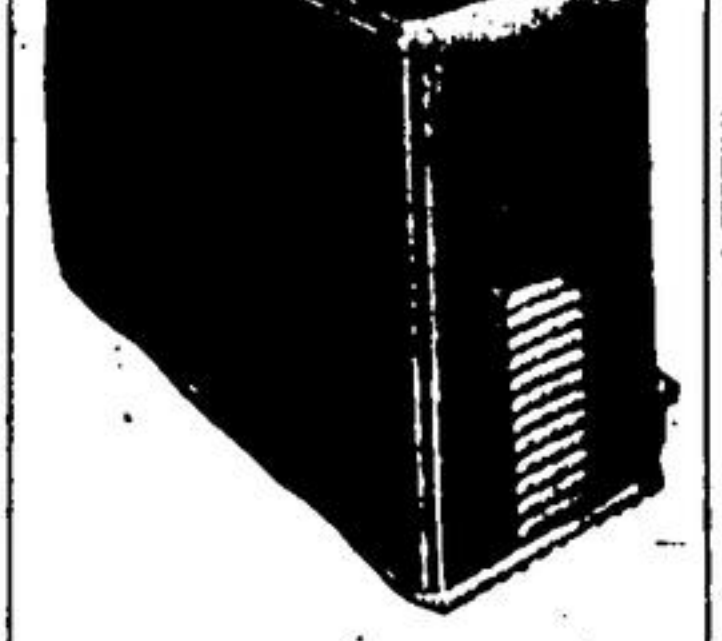

Irate motorists stranded on hills around the area were furious at sanding crews for not getting out Sunday when the heavy snow first started.

Little did they know Clarence Caswell, owner of Caswell Paving Co., Durham, contractor for the Department of Highways sanding contract No. 7 and No. 25 highways was having trouble as well.

As soon as the snow began, Mr. Caswell ordered his five trucks on the move. Only they didn't move — someone had poured water and sand in gas tanks. Two of the trucks managed to creep less than half a mile away from the sanding pit near Creswell's Corners out of Acton before they stopped.

Gas tanks had to be removed and sand drained. Fuel lines cleaned and in some cases new fuel pumps installed. Sand was being spread over the highway shortly before 5 p.m. By this time several accidents had occurred and motorists were left stranded on hills throughout the route covered by the sanding crew.
