## New Home to be Three Storeys

A three-storey design has been agreed upon for the new Haltom Manor, the Manor board of directors informed County Council on Tuesday.

Architect Donald E. Skinner had shown proposed drawings on both a two-storey and a three-storey building to the Manor board at the last meeting. Members agreed upon the three-storey structure with services on the lower floor and had care and special care occupying separate floors.

The plan announced three months ago in The Champion, is for the addition of a 300-bed building on the same site of Haltom Manor's prospects on Highway 25, Milton, but not at reached to the present Manor. The Department of Welfare feels 300 beds is the size limit for a home for the aged and the present Manor has 225 beds.

The superintendent was asked to locate block plans and elevations for the new building or hire a surveyor to plot the existing buildings and elevations. Soil tests are also being taken on the property.

The committee of management has approved a "new-look" design for the new building's windows to allow maximum use of existing light.
