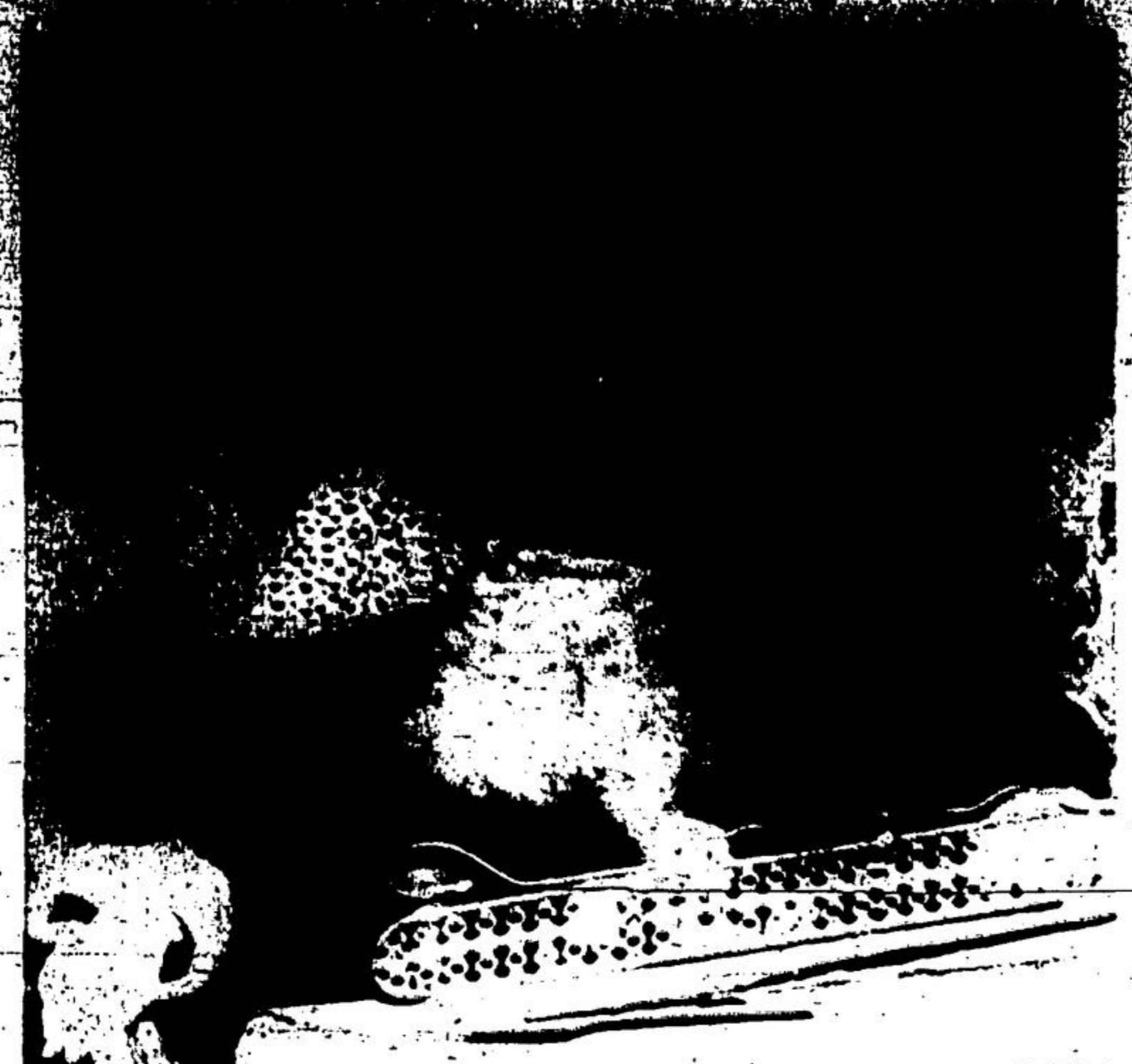


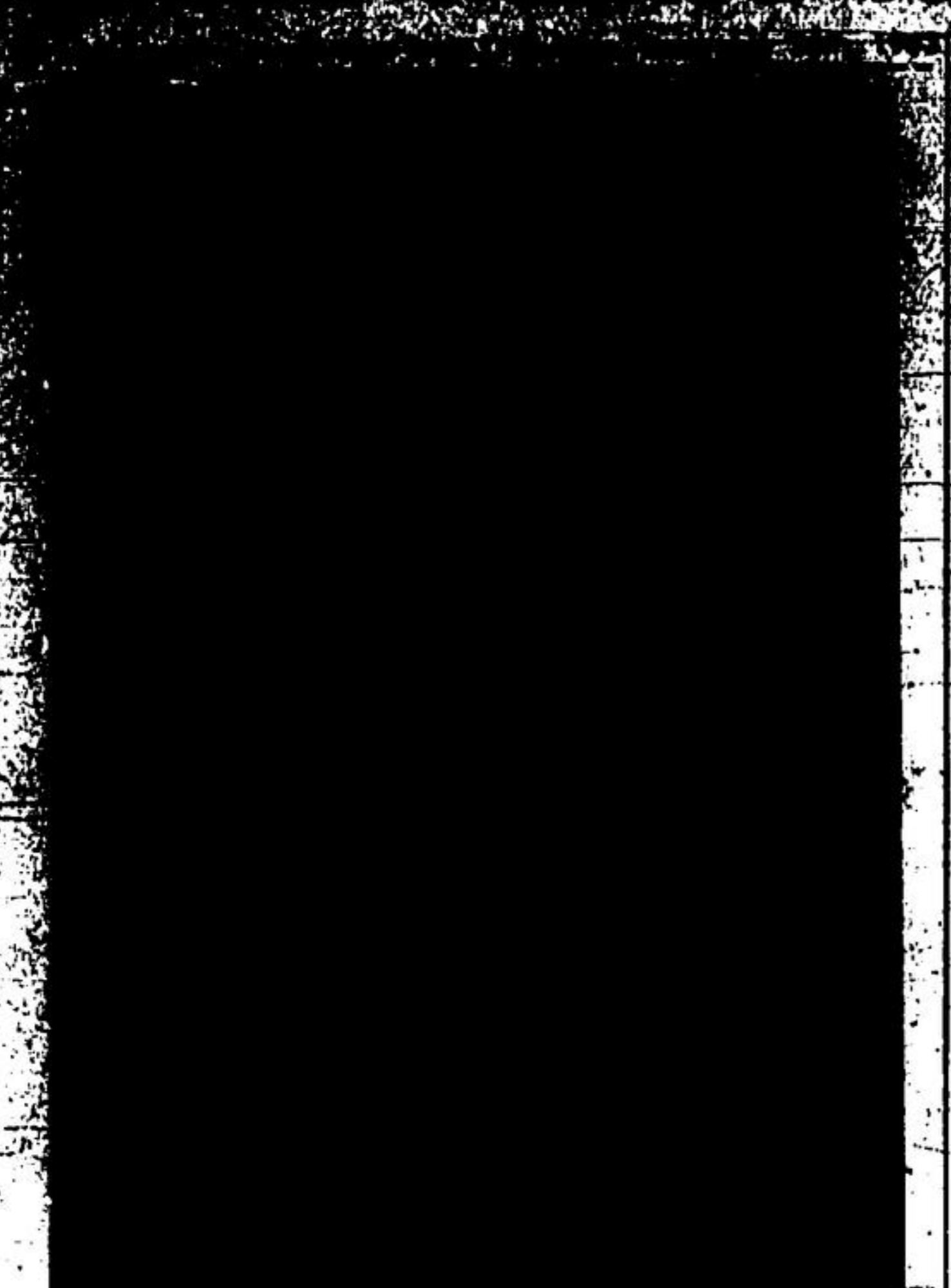
# Beardmore Christmas Party Despite Below - Zero Weather

## Guernsey Association Ontario Votes on Directors

Election of 1964 Directors for the Canadian Guernsey Breeders Association will be held only in Ontario, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island as a result of nominations received in the office of the Association at Guelph as of December 9, the deadline for nominations.

Elected by acclamation for a second term of office are the following Directors: British Columbia — C. A. France; Chihuahua — R. N. Ralph; Saskatchewan — and Manitoba — Art Rampton; Dauphin, Quebec — Remi St. Jacques; Lachute, Nova Scotia and Newfoundland — Francis W. Bishop; Bridgetown, N.S.

The large number of nominations in Ontario reflects the wide spread interest in Association activities which have shown steady growth since its organization in 1908 and more particularly since the Association established its permanent Head Office in Guelph in 1945 at which time the first full time employee of the Association was hired. Association activities include supervision of registrations, promotion of breed improvement programs and the promotion of its Trade Mark Milk — Golden Guernsey, Guernsey, Royal and Guernsey Gold.

The election of Directors in Ontario will be completed by mail ballot with all members as of September 30, 1963 being eligible to vote. Ballots must be returned to the Association of 168 Woodwich St. Guelph, by January 21, 1964.
