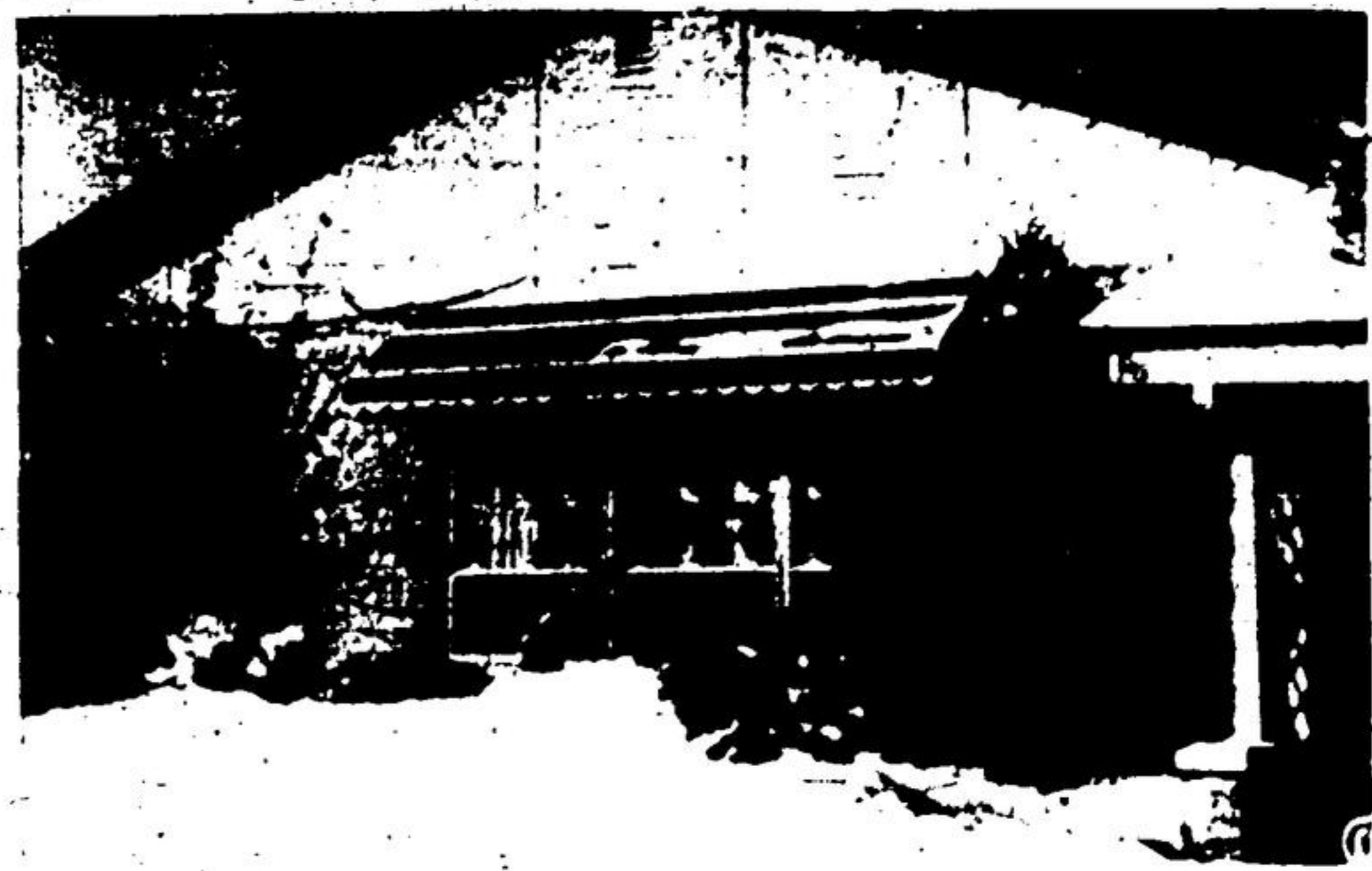

Police Village Since 1914

Campbellville's 50th Birthday Will be Celebrated This Year

EDITOR'S NOTE: This brief history of the Village of Campbellville was compiled by staff reporter Roy Brown. Information used in the article was obtained from the 1958 booklet, *Nassagawya Centennial*, published by a voluntary committee headed by M. J. Carlin under the direction of the Township Council; from the 1889 "History of Nassagawya" compiled by the late Joshua Norrish, which was included in the centennial booklet; and from *Gwen Clarke's* 1955 history of the village, "Haltion's Pages of the Past."

As 1964 draws, the village of Campbellville marks its 50th anniversary as a Police Village.

It was back in 1914 that the first three village trustees were named to govern the municipal affairs of the village. Today three trustees still operate the community, which has grown to a population of around 300.

John Campbell first settled in the village and the community was named after him. After crossing the ocean from Scotland in 1831, Mr. Campbell, his wife and five children travelled by boat and sometimes on foot through the virgin forests until they reached the stream at what is now Campbellville in 1832. He set up a saw-mill and eventually surveyed the village and gave the streets the names Colin, Queen and Mary. Later, he also donated land for the first cemetery.

Bridge and Dam
His first dwelling was reported to be covered with hemlock boughs—located in the east half of lot 4 in concession 3. The saw mill was built in 1838 after he convinced the Township of Nassagawya roads committee that it would be best to build a bridge over the creek where he wanted to erect his dam for the saw mill and the committee ordered the overseer to help build the combined dam and bridge.

The Township was of course already established at this time. According to records, David Scott must have been the first settler and he arrived in 1821 to settle on lot 1, concession 7. The second was probably William Trueman, a native of England, who obtained lot 22, concession 3, in 1823.

Wild Wilderness
In those early days the district was a heavily wooded wilderness full of wild animals including bears, lynx and wildcat. Eventually, more settlers moved in and churches, schools, stores, taverns, homes and industries were built.

There are still a few descendants of the early pioneers living in the village. Miss Rita Hubbert, present postmistress, is the daughter of Richard Hubbert and granddaughter of Michael Hubbert, the first village shoe maker who was famed for his shoes. Other pioneer names still prevalent there are McPhail, Garrett, Edey, McLaren, Black, Mahon, Angus and others.

In 1848, the first tavern opened. Maxwell Campbell kept the first store and hotel offices in 1849. There was a shoe shop opened in 1854, and a tannery that opened in 1848. The original saw mill was replaced by a steam mill in 1852, and was kept busy until about 1873 when most of the pine in the district had been cut.

Railway Comes
A blacksmith shop opened in 1842, and James McPhail opened one in 1857. Another began in 1900. The railroad (C.P.R.) opened through the village about 1880 and the Terra Cotta works, now the site of Crawford Lumber, began about 1888.

There were several hotels in the village and a daily stage once passed that way. In 1891, a carriage and furniture business opened where the King Calcium Company office now stands. This company was formed in 1905 and still makes dry dust extractors.

One of Campbellville's native sons was Thomas Blacklock, a noted journalist and a member of the Parliamentary Press Gallery at Ottawa. Born in 1871, he died in 1934 and was buried at Campbellville. Among other notable attendees at the ceremony were Sir Robert Borden, Prime Minister, R. B. Bennett, Hon. Hugh Guthrie and Hon. R. J. Manion.

Presbyterian Church
The first church was the Presbyterian Church, built in 1869 and it was used until 1940, when the present building was erected. The Royal Orange Lodge was founded in 1865 and the Orange Hall opened in 1877. The Royal Templars of Temperance, organized from 1860 to about 1900, Campbell Lodge was organized in 1922 and the present Lodge Hall was built in the late 1930's after their original rented hall was destroyed by fire.

The Ancient Order of Foresters, Canadian Home Circle, Canadian Order of Chosen Friends and the Canadian Order of Foresters each had a lodge in the village at one time. The Women's Institute was formed in 1902, lapsed a while later and was reformed in 1937.

Sidewalks of Boards
The first board walks were built in 1900 and concrete walks were laid in 1914 when the village was incorporated as a Police Village. The first trustees were Frank A. Wheelahan, Dr. George H. Carbert and C. A. E. Sley.

In 1924, electricity came to the community and there were 24 users when it was first turned on. Street lights were installed in 1924 and the village trustees have recently modernized and expanded the street lighting.

The public school was built in 1927. The present Early's garage was the site of a noted hotel which was sold to Robert J. Early in 1923. The township's first public garage was established there and it has been in operation ever since.

Two General Stores
The present Coulter's General Store was built in 1914.

Born on a beautiful 200 acre farm in Esquimaux Township, Halton Centennial Manor resident Mrs. Emma Bennett, the former Emma Cook, celebrated her 90th birthday yesterday (Wednesday). "I'm feeling pretty well," the resident told the Free Press, "but my eyesight is gradually getting worse."

Spry and cheery, Mrs. Bennett is able to dress herself and get around without help, she said. Born on a farm on the Seventh Concession of Esquimaux Township, she moved to Georgetown when she married and remained in Georgetown until she took up residence in the Manor about a year ago.

"I used to do a lot of church work in Georgetown with the United Church, but housekeeping was my hobby."

"I wish I was back in Georgetown, it was a lovely spot, but we're really lucky to have a place like this to come to," she said, referring to the Manor.
