**HARLEY...to HALTON**

The House of Commons is extremely busy at the moment — morning, afternoon and night. Each morning finds committee meetings trying to complete their committee work prior to the end of the session.

It is anticipated that the session will end near Christmas, which will mean a new session in the New Year with a Throne Speech and all the formalities once again. All the Committees and their work will die with the session, therefore, the work must be concluded and reported to the House of Commons prior to the end of the session. As far as the Special Committee on Road and Drags, of which I have the honor to be Chairman, is concerned, a report on insecticides and pesticides should be ready. The cost and safety of drugs will have to be done next session.

During the Parliamentary hours there is much legislation to be gotten through before the recess which often results in sittings being prolonged past normal closing hours. I am pleased to know that most of the Members now seem disposed to work conscientiously and with a minimum of procedural wrangles.

**Benefit Halton**

The decision by the Studebaker Company to move its production to Hamilton should generally benefit our riding, particularly Burlington. I understand that within three months, 600 new employees will be required. While not in Halton, this should generally stimulate the area so close to Hamilton. It is anticipated that they will be able to import their car bodies from the United States without tax difficulties because of recent legislation allowing imports into Canada tax free as long as they are equalled by exports.

A Federal Government loan of \$24,000 has been approved to Burlington for construction of a sewage treatment plant. This is a loan for 20 years, at 5 1/2% interest, and if the work is completed by 1st March 1965, 25% of the loan and interest need not be repaid. This will extend trunk sewer service from the new treatment plant to the western section of the town. This brings to four the number of loans to Burlington totalling almost \$2 million dollars to assist in pollution control.

I would like to extend my congratulations to the victors in recent elections throughout the riding and offer my assistance at any time.

**Conservation**

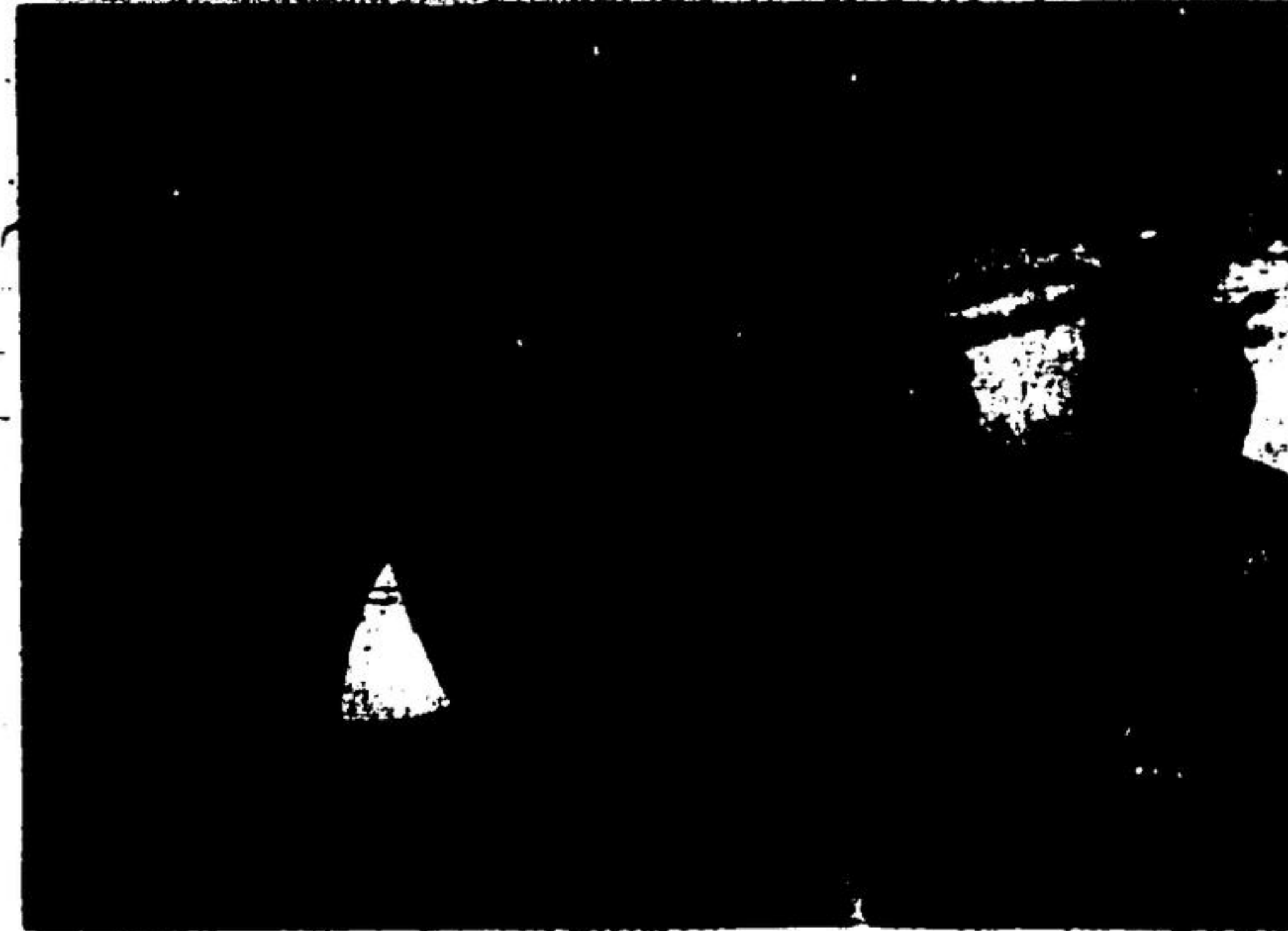
I know that there is a great deal of interest in Halton on water conservation and water pollution. Oakville and Burlington of course are especially interested as they are on the shores of Lake Ontario and the more northerly parts of the County of course being more rural have vital water needs. I have noted editorials in this in our County papers, I thought therefore that it would be of great interest to relate to you at a talk I heard today at a luncheon.

Recognizing the need in the Great Lakes system for more water the speaker revealed his plan for a grand canal — which stands for Great Replenishment and Northern Development.

This is not a new idea and a few years ago would have been termed fantastic. It can still be called that, but also feasible. The plan is to place a dam across the bottom of James Bay, forming a new lake. This will mean fresh water rather than the salt water that one would get by a canal direct to James Bay. Water is pumped to the watershed near Mattawa and here diverted by canal either to Georgian Bay or the St. Lawrence via the Ottawa River.

The prospects of this are staggering as it would produce approximately 14 times our present water needs plus unlimited hydro-electric power. It would also provide a water route from James Bay to the Great Lakes, down the Mississippi via the Chicago diversion to the Gulf of Mexico. This would cost, if the money were loaned approximately \$4 billion dollars but would return to Canada in power and water, a tremendous store of these vital resources.
