Reclaim Park Land, Mayor Urges

The inaugural address given Monday by Mayor Les Duby follows:

Monday, January 6, 1964

Certain changes have been made in committees, which you will note, compared to last year. Such as:

1. Assessment is now in No. 1 Committee under Administration, where it should be.

2. Welfare is now in No. 2 Committee, under the working committee of council, due to the road building, landscaping etc., involved in the new cemetery area for 1964.

3. Industrial will now be known as Development, which more truly describes the function of this committee. However, this committee will still be the liaison between council and the Acton Industrial Commission.

4. A new committee has been formed, to be known as Lights and Sanitation (Street Lights)

and Garbage). This will allow us to reduce the load and responsibility of the Road Chairman, who will be busy enough with roads, walks and general maintenance.

Our Reeve and Deputy Reeve will retain their same status as last year, due to their heavy commitment of meetings at Council Council. This should result in a very efficient council for the town.

Budget will be heavy until the Budget is struck at the end of March. From this time on, our Deputy Reeve will be a Budget "watch dog".

It is understood that our Reeve, Mr. Hinton, has undertaken to contest the Wardenship of Halton County. I would, at this time like to convey to him the best wishes of myself and council.

In keeping with local tradition, I will attempt to give my

impression of what the coming year's inaugural directive should be, as a guide to all members of council, in projecting their programs for 1964.

Due to careful planning and spending, we now enjoy a most desirable assessment ratio, which we should try to maintain by all means.

No one can guarantee a reduction in taxes but we can try to hold the line if demands are not too great.

Taxes caused by people. If additional services continue to be demanded, we may have to add mills to the present rate to produce the revenue required.

While we most certainly will always try to hold or reduce our mill rate, the trend today is increased taxation. This is everywhere — it is not unique in Acton.

Increased cost of services general maintenance and education readily justify this trend.

While I dislike the use of the word "Austerity", we still must organize a co-operative program for all committees and yet satisfy our ratepayers with a year of steady progress.

Tax Appeals

To our Finance committee, I would suggest it is high time we started to police our tax arrears situation. Some of these blighted giant bonfires hung over Glenelg like big fog for an hour or so afterwards.

Not many centres have this blazing send-off to the used Christmas trees. There is a similar arrangement in Brampston.

Our assessment committee will have to concern itself with realization that 24 building per-

mits issued last year only netted us a figure of \$292,450, as compared with 15 permits netting a figure of \$325,150 in construction in 1962.

The budget committee will require all committee and board budgets to be in by the end of February, to enable them to come up with a tax rate by March 31.

Project Costs

Since we have projected our capital expenditures over the next five years, we might do well to consider protecting our current costs in the same way.

Holiday schedules for our staff and work force have always been a problem when they are drawn out over a long period of time. It seriously hampers our work program. We should try to establish some means of handling it in 8 to 10 weeks of the July and August period.

Our road committee should take early action in calling tenders on the Brock and Church St. bridges as soon as weather permits in the spring.

We should still consider the advantages to be gained by contracting our garbage by the sanitary land fill method.

Water Cost

The Sewer and Water Department cannot avoid any longer finding the answer to making the operation pay for itself.

Since we cannot justly tax the owners of real property any fur-

ther on this matter, it must become an additional assessment on the user as a slight increase in rates. I put forward the suggestion on Editorial Page.

Acton Reeve Joins Race 3 Contest Warden's Seat

Halton County Council holds its inaugural meeting next Tuesday afternoon in Milton, and a three-way race for the honored position of Warden should be the highlight of the afternoon's proceedings.

Reeve H. H. Hinton of Acton this week joined the fray, as he announced his intention to contest the seat against Reeve Herbert C. Merry of Oakville and Gordon Gallagher of Burlington. All three are well experienced in municipal affairs and it could be a tossup for the job when the 14 councillors meet.

One Vote Apiece

The Warden occupies the top seat in the county for a year at a time and presides over the body of county councillors, two from each of the seven towns and townships in Halton. For the election of a Warden each councillor has just one vote, and a tie vote would be broken by the municipality with the largest ratable assessment — in this case Oakville.

In former years the position of Warden has been an honor rotated around the county from municipality to municipality with the north end holding the post one year and the south end the next year. In recent years this policy has become more unorthodox, and Wardens were elected on their merit rather than the location of the voters they represented.

If all three candidates can be considered equal contenders, observers feel the system of north-south turns may come into the picture, and in that case Reeve Gallagher might get the nod.

Past Wardens

Burlington last held the Wardenship in 1953 but the township of Nelson, which was amalgamated with Burlington last held it in 1949. Acton had a Warden in 1954 and Oakville (including Trafalgar) has had four between 1942 and 1951.

Mr. Gallagher has been a member of County Council three and one-half years as Burlington's Deputy Reeve, and a Burlington councillor four years. He was also a member of the Burlington Suburban Area planning Board over 10 years and chairman four years. This is his first year as Reeve.

He feels it is definitely Burlington's turn and explains the town's population has grown from 6,000 when they last had a Warden, to a total of 52,000 today.

Mr. Hinton was nominated for the post last year and withdrew but announced his intention to run this year. He feels it is Acton's turn.
