Prayer meetings held in Guelph on Tuesday.

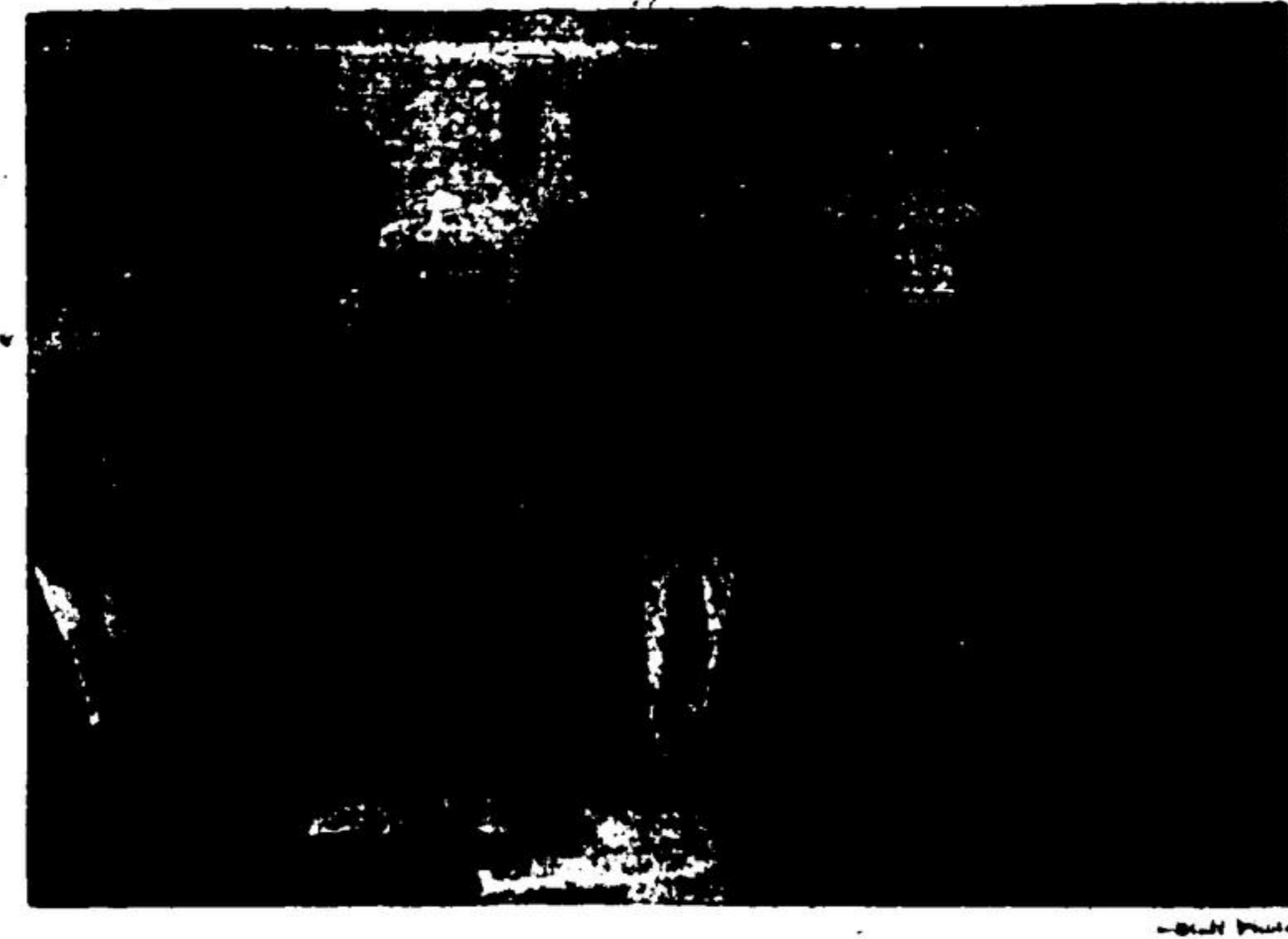
