## Plant Physiology Topic Of Growers' Association

The Burlington and District Fruit and Vegetable Growers' Association held their first meeting in the Town Hall, Burlington under president of Chas Brown of Upper Middle Road. Mr. Brown succeeded Walter Johnson of Walkerville. First vice-president John Flanders, Milton, son and vice-president William Donald, Novato; secretary-treasurer, Ed Wozniarski, Acton; assistant secretary, John Nicholson, Frelton.

Dr. John Wicks research work from Vineland was the key note at the meeting. The role of sunlight in food production in plants and the effect of temperature on the growth of plants was outlined. Dr. Wicks explained why certain plants grow better under one given set of conditions and that plants differ markedly in these requirements. Physical laws of respiration, transpiration

and nutrient uptake were explained for all to understand.

## Loading Ahead

If the production adds up to some \$80,000 pounds of mushrooms per crop in the present area how many mushrooms will be produced when 10 more hours are added to the building now to use and two more added? 20 units each will be added?

That's the owner's present plan and this summer work will begin on the new addition. When everything is completed about 125 employees will be on the payroll. At present there are over 90 including some seasonal laborers and some from the Burlington plant.

When you keep a few hours with mushrooms and others a few moments in bushes, you might wonder where they have disappeared to. According to Sam, the mushrooms are dried and packed away according to Mr. G. McMichael, who is well known for his own business.

## Never Peel

Good for the person who has had a bowel trouble from eating a small helping of food. Put your plate high with mushrooms tonic after this.
