**Large New Schools Slated
For Village, Eramosa Twp.**

At a special meeting of the Eramosa school board held on January 16, a far-reaching plan for school accommodation in Eramosa township was passed.

Two large graded schools will be needed — one at Rockwood village and one in the township centre. These two schools should eventually have from 8 to 12 rooms.

The central school at present being planned for occupation this

year will have 7 classrooms plus a gymnasium. In the future a gymnasium is also planned for Rockwood.

Junior schools at No. 2 and No. 11 will be maintained as long as needed. The town hall expenses will also be paid for a public school speaking contest to be held there.

When the seven-room school is completed seven of the old one room schools will be closed. Many are nearly 100 years old.

Sausage Peacherino

Serves 5 Easy and Economical

Combine sausage, onion, bread crumbs, egg and sea-some. Form into ten balls. Bake in shallow pan in moderate oven (350 deg. F.) 25 minutes. Remove from oven. Drain off fat. Drain peach halves and stud with 46 cloves. Place a sausage ball on top of each peach half. Add syrup and return to oven for 20 minutes basting with syrup.
