Day of Prayer Service Unique

Representatives of the United, Presbyterian, Baptist, Christian Reformed, Pentecostal, Evangelical Baptist and Anglican churches will conduct the service on the World Day of Prayer, being observed in St. Alban's church on Friday, February 14.

The service this year is prepared by Miss Madeleine Barot of France. In 1940 she sought to help the victims of war who were interned in concentration camps in occupied France. She succeeded in getting interned so she might work inside the prisons where she had been denied entrance. Today she works in the World Council of Churches and has chosen as the theme of this year's service "Let Us Pray."

Fire Prevention Bureau Chairman Outlines Work in Annual Report

The following is the annual report of the Halton County Fire Prevention Bureau for 1963, compiled by the 1963 chairman, Chief E. Lewis of Georgetown.

We take pleasure in submitting our report on fire prevention work for 1963. The bureau met in Milton Fire Hall each month, with the exception of July and August, to plan work for prevention and safety in the county. Election of officers and committees was held on Tuesday, January 8, 1963, as follows:

Chairman, E. Lewis, Georgetown; vice-chairman, William Williams, Acton; secretary, Wes Miller, Oakville; treasurer, Henry Wilson, Oakville; literature chairman, Douglas Wilson, Oakville; publicity, A. E. Clement and Roy Downs, Milton; inspections, George Bundy, Milton; posters and trophies, Ivan Clarridge, Milton; Christmas fire safety, George Wright, Oakville; auditors, E. Perkins, R. Millford and W. Miller, all of Oakville.

An average attendance of 19 men from the fire departments in Halton County attended our meetings, giving of their time, experience and efforts to better our fire prevention and safety in Halton County. The work of the bureau is

shown by constant reminders in the newspapers, radio, television, through homes, schools, stores, factories and churches.

Literature distributed this year included 30,000 Spring Cleanup posters; 40,000 pieces on planning escapes, checking fire hazards and electrical hazards on farms; 6,000 poster cards; 20,000 restaurant tags; 6,500 fire department fire door warning signs; and 500 Christmas posters for churches and public buildings, plus other miscellaneous literature.

The fire inspection blitz was postponed for this year, due to the yearly inspections regularly carried out in the towns concerning fire doors, stores, and open fire halls, when equipment and fire prevention were demonstrated. Our church postcard in Burlington was a huge success.

A poster drawing contest was held for all grade 5 pupils, who drew causes and prevention of home fires. Approximately 500 children participated and two winners were chosen for the county. The girl was Brenda Mitchell of the Strathcona School, Burlington, and the boy
