Small GM Car Tested in North General Motors of Canada this week announced that a new small GM car — tested at the prototype stage in the Canadian North during winter, 1963 — will shortly be available to the Canadian public.

The Viva, a two-door four-passenger car manufactured by Vauxhall of England, is in the 1,000 cubic centimeter engine class.

Extensive tests, including winter tests at 40 degrees below zero at the Canadian winter testing site at Kapuskasing, Ont., have proven the Viva superior in handling, acceleration, all-weather performance, comfort, and spaciousness to other cars in this field.

The prototype Viva was driven in the dead of winter last year from Montreal to Oshawa, then 650 miles north to Kapuskasing—only 175 miles south of James Bay.

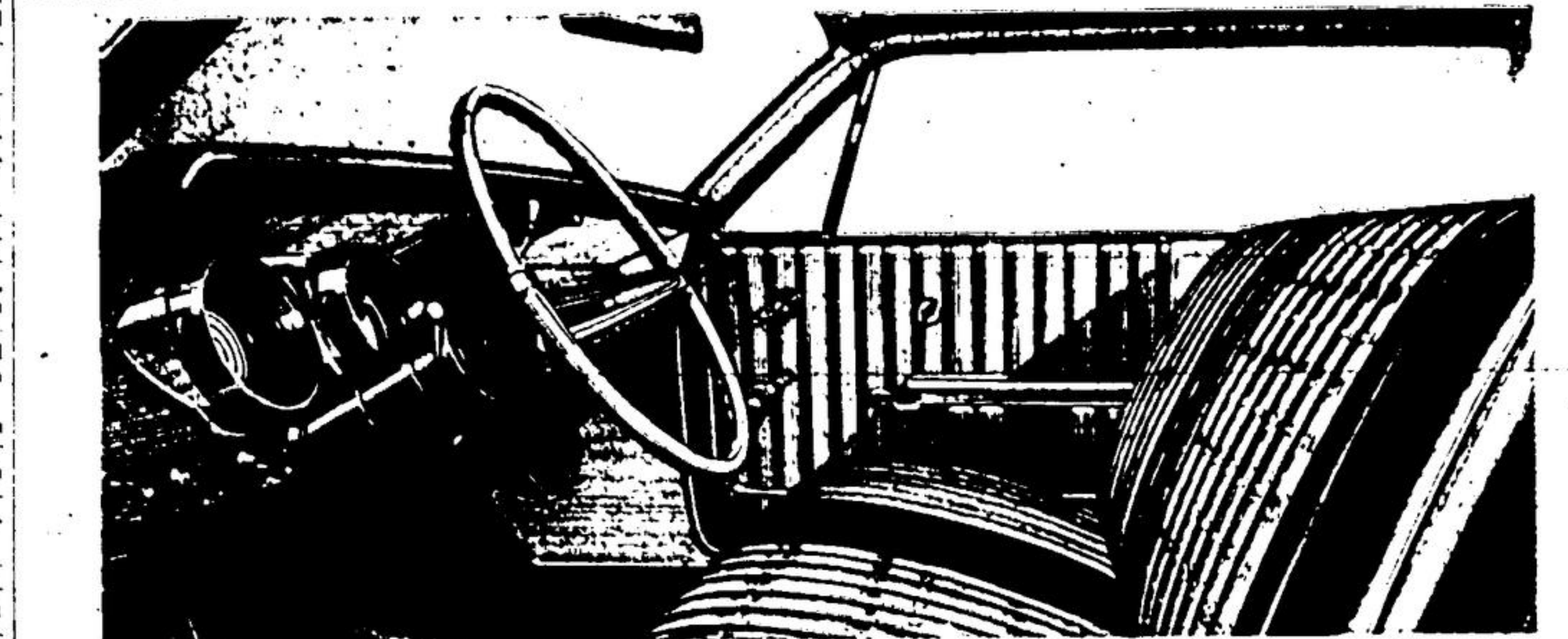
The Viva's lightweight 50 horsepower four-cylinder engine proved it gave the Viva excellent power for its weight — particularly advantageous for passing on long grades.

Handling on icy, snow covered roads was surprisingly stable, owing to the low — 21 inch — centre of gravity and the special Viva suspension, which is new in passenger cars, though it has been used in racing cars.

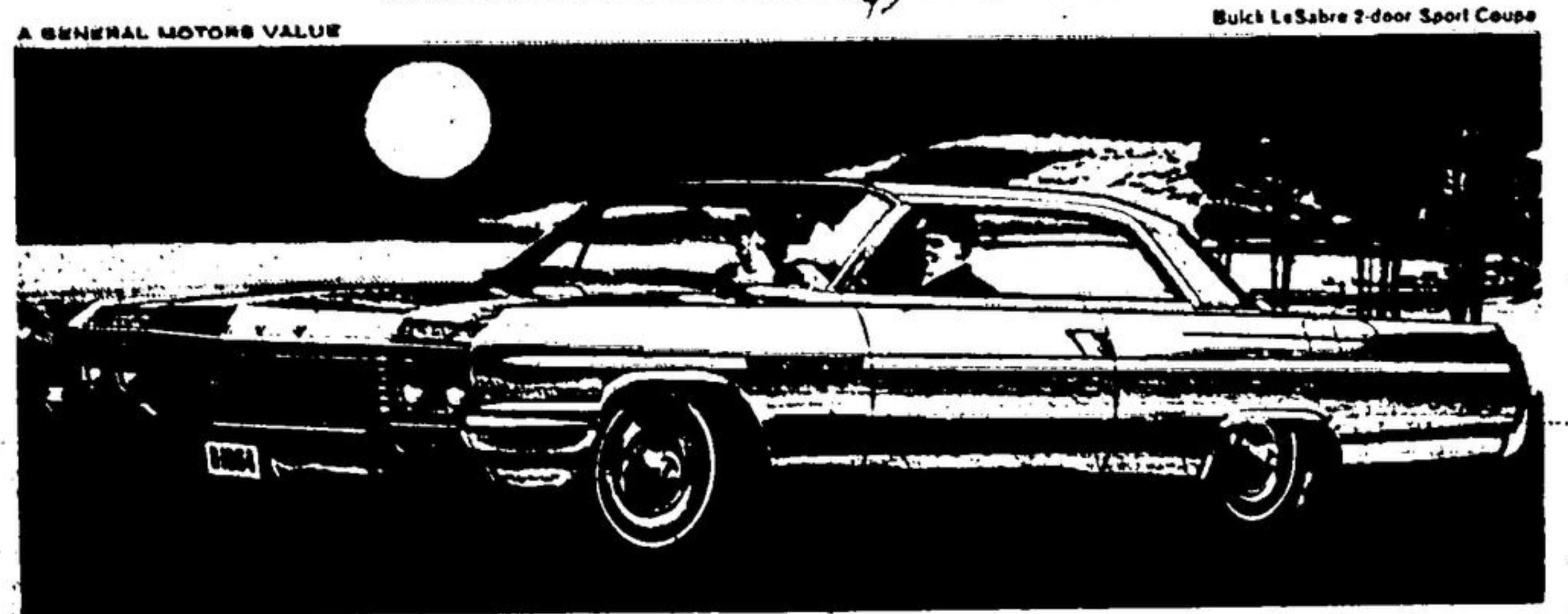
