64th Birthday  
For all I.O.D.E.

The I.O.D.E. (Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire) celebrates its 64th birthday today.

The Order's 976 chapters recall its growth from a small group of Canadian women supplying clothes for Boer War soldiers, to a national voluntary organization raising over \$1,000,000 for education, emergency welfare, and other community services.

Activities in the educational field, where more than \$350,000 is spent annually, have been expanded within the past two years to include a school adoption program in Canada's Far North.

Sixty-two schools and eight hostels in the Yukon and Northwest Territories have been adopted. Forty-two schools in Northern and Southern Labrador, and 34 remote and isolated schools in Newfoundland, have recently become part of this project.

The I.O.D.E. school adoption program now extends from the Atlantic to the Pacific, and from the Arctic to the Caribbean. School adoption involves gifts of new libraries, library additions, prize books, visual aids, recreational and study material. Other projects include scholarships, welfare and allied projects in the Dominion as well as local fields.

The I.O.D.E. is one of the largest voluntary women's organizations in Canada. In this fast changing world it strives to keep pace through education, promote unity within the Commonwealth and give service to the needy.

In Acton, the Duke of Devonshire Chapter is 47 years old and the Lakeside Chapter 45 years old.
