## No Pay for Commission Vote Down Resolution

Chairman Tyler said he had heard more comment regarding commission fees in the past week than any time since the policy to stop fees was adopted. "The majority of people who mentioned it were unaware we weren't being paid. A few were indifferent. Generally, the public is not against commissioners drawing pay and I don't think they are laughing at us."

The commission's decision to discontinue meeting fees received a very good response from the public, Mr. Beatty recalled. Councillor Arbie compared work at council level with that of the commission and said in the six weeks on council this year he figured he had already put in equivalent to six months of hydro work.

Mr. Arbie said it might not be a bad idea to consider a community incinerator as more and more people move into rural areas. Mr. Irwin said the committee hoped to eliminate as many of the problems as possible as cheaply as possible. Further study will be given the problem by No. 2 committee before any action is taken on garbage disposal.

Commissioner McEachern said he believed 90 per cent of the public were of the opinion the commissioners were paid and wondered where along the line council members began getting paid for their work. Vice-chairman Doug Dawkins claimed he was only a new member feeling his way and said the pay proposal at the last meeting was not signed. He also claimed the \$20 and \$15 figures which are being paid to the Georgetown Commission were ridiculous and said these figures were only used as tentative figures "to kick around."

**Credit Union Tax**  
Six members of Acton Credit Union were present to request council's consideration in cancelling business tax for the Credit Union until it becomes better established. Robert Drinkwater acted as spokesman for the group and was told council would discuss the request and inform him later.

Resolved Quickly  
What had the commission gained by dropping meeting fees a few years ago? Mr. McEachern asked. Replied Mr. Beatty, "we made it clear that no one was serving for personal gain."

**Your Town**  
A committee of council was formed to finalize arrangements for an Urban Board tour of the town May 20. Tours of both Georgetown and Milton have already been taken at which time Urban Board members and wives enjoyed a bus trip of each town followed by a lunch. The purpose of the trip is to outline industrial and commercial areas and acquaint out-of-town councillors with each community.

Council also  
Set a public hearing on the proposed zoning by-law for April 2.  
Cancelled the regular council meeting next week in favor of budget committee meeting.  
Approved accounts totalling \$8,676.46.

**Lack of Dog Control**  
During enquiries by members councillor Hamilton Peal relayed complaints from several ratepayers regarding dogs running at large and lack of dog control. He suggested immediate investigation into the dog control problem and was told this would be done.

Also present were Al Green and Norm Fryer from the Acton I.O.I. to outline the route of the proposed parade for the district Orangemen's day to be held in Acton, July 11. The delegates said they had received approval from Corporal Ray Mason for the marching route. Only comment by Mayor Dubs was "It sure looks like a healthy march."

## Residents Oppose Move To Rezone Park Area

Loyal McCutcheon remarked that if the property was levelled and seeded, "you would see a marvellous change." He also reported the sweepings from the street sweeper had been dumped on the land. "It could be a very nice playground."

The town has relocated a hydro high voltage line in the area and has completed a ditching and drainage program.

**Services Installed**  
Mayor Dubs pointed out the sewer lines were in the middle of the street and the water mains were on the north side, which would facilitate the servicing of the area. "There is a problem with pre-school children but we must realize we also have the problems of a growing town. It would be out of line with our budget to provide playgrounds in every area of town."

Mr. Payne said, "This is a small area — something to use every day. The ratepayers are not asking you to give up anything — just not to interrupt something they already have and were led to believe would have." John McHugh felt the parks board could level the area so that it would be possible to cut the grass. "We want to retain what we bought the property for."

**Up to Municipal Board**  
As the situation now stands, the town has had the official plan changed to residential and approved by the Minister. The town is applying to the Municipal Board to have the zoning by-law amended to conform to the official plan.

The town has sold lots and is unable to issue building permits for the properties until the Municipal Board decides either to rezone or maintain the zoning status. The Municipal Board may call a public hearing to receive evidence in support of and opposed to the change to residential. If the Municipal Board decides in favor of rezoning, the town will issue building permits. If the Municipal Board decides to maintain the present zoning, the town has agreed to repurchase the lots sold, plus land
