PLUM ROLY POLY Serves 8 for a Snack or Dessert

3 cups biscuit mix
 2 tablespoons melted butter
 1/4 cup sugar
 2 teaspoons cinnamon
 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
 1 cup canned strained plums (or junior plums)

Prepare your own biscuit dough or use a prepared mix. Roll out in 15 x 10 inch rectangle. Spread with melted butter. Combine sugar and spices. Sprinkle 1/2 on biscuit mix. Spread with strained plums leaving a 1 inch margin. Sprinkle with remaining sugar and spices. Roll up and cut in 1 inch slices. Place slices cut side up in a greased pan or mud tin. Bake in hot oven (450 deg. F.) 15-18 minutes.
