ROCKWOOD Hose Reels for Fire Truck Debated by Township Council

A special meeting of Eramosa township council was called by the Reeve recently. Jack Peart asked council to give consideration to purchasing some hose reels for the township fire truck and F. Schneider presented the financial statement of Rockwood Fire Scout Group Committee for 1963 and asked for a grant to be considered by council to the organization. Reeve Lush promised that council would consider both requests.

Late last year the county had applied for \$250,000 to be applied against the project which was then estimated at \$750,000. Only one-third of the amount is available from this fund.

Reeve C. A. Martin, chairman of the Manor Board, noted preliminary estimates had been optimistic and it now appeared costs would be closer to \$1,000,000.
