It was "grants" day at Halton County Council last week, when representatives of the Lorne Scots regiment and the Salvation Army presented their annual appeals for funds.

## Thanks for Aid

Maj. R. G. Hardy, speaking for the Lorne Scots expressed thanks to the county for their assistance in the presentation of the colors that took place during the past year. Total cost of the event by and was about \$20,000, including uniforms, band equipment, wages and preparation of the grounds.

Maj. Hardy also reviewed the weekend exercises, camps and the fact the regiment was judged the best in Ontario. The regiment includes 419, which he suggested is quite large by militia standards. He asked the county to consider half last year's grant.

## Unwed Mothers

Captain Geo. King, representing the Salvation Army, asked only that the county continue its grant

at the previous level. He noted that at the home for unmarried mothers in Hamilton 125 girls had been cared for, eight of them from Halton. "They are coming to us now at a much earlier age, some at 13 and 14", he told council.

The Captain also reviewed the Salvation Army work through its service centre for men, the work of its correctional officers working with probation officers, and the missing persons bureau.

He emphasized the county grant was used entirely in social welfare work.



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
