Oakville, Burlington Pay 83% Of County's Total 1964 Costs

Oakville and Burlington will pay nearly 83 per cent of the county costs in 1964, based on the county's paying \$69,750 per cent, then \$211,528,177 assessment. The figures were revealed in a report to Halton County Council last week.

Total county assessment is \$254,986,424. Of that the two southern municipalities have \$211,528,177.

Oakville will be the big contributor with 44.17227 per cent

Burlington is second with \$178,437 per cent Georgetown claims third place paying \$69,750 per cent, Milton with \$44,195 per cent, and Nassagaweya with 1.25488 per cent. The total value of crown and H.L.P.C. properties on which grants are paid in lieu of tax in Halton is \$1,686,150 for Ontario and \$332,238 for Canada.

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
