Ask Family Councillor, Half-Way House Here

The welfare committee of Halton County Council tabled a recommendation Tuesday that the county engage a Family Counsellor as part of the county's welfare and family court activities.

Family Court Judge M. M. Langdon suggested the services of a family counsellor would be valuable to the court. The Judge also suggested establishment of a half-way house to which teenage boys could be sent by the Juvenile Court, rather than to Training School or Reformatory.

His suggestion, received by the committee, was to set up a pilot project by renting suitable quarters and installing foster parents who would endeavor to give the boys the necessary care and training to prevent their commitment to institutions, where they would be associated with other delinquents whose influence may very well lead to further trouble for these boys.

These were no final decisions on either hiring of a family counsellor or establishment of a half-way house.
