Fumbly Tanners Concede First Robin

Acton Tanners, never scrupulously superstitious, might regard last Friday as an omen. Fergus Flyers, however, will welcome another and many of them, thank you. After all, they clipped the Tanners 5-2 in a "house" played open to the W.O.A.A. intermediate "C" major round robin play-off series in front of 700 tumultuous fans, most of whom had come to see the Acton club win.

They didn't, not so much because the Flyers played a better brand of hockey. They were the better opportunists, knew how to take advantage of frequent Tanner mistakes, and in the matter of outtumbling the fumbly Tanners had a clean cut decision.

The Tanners took a 1-0 lead in the first period which left goal keepers at both ends breathless from the number and velocity of the pucks whistled at them. Nipper Marshall in the Acton cage handled everything the Flyers could throw at him. Prickett in the Fergus net, let one shot by him, from the stick of Ron Melton.

In the second stanza, Redwood knotted the count for Fergus in the second minute of play and Bob Dobbin drilled a goal at 7:27 to put them ahead. While Watt sat out a sentence in the latter part of the period Fred Kentner evened it at 2:2 on a neat play with Jim Casburn and Harold Townsley.

Three in Third

The third period was the climax. The Tanners let so many loose pucks in front of Norm Lockhurst, who by this time had replaced Jack Marshall in the nets, Ron Tippin fired two within

21 seconds to move Flyers back in front 4-2. Gary Watt plucked another in the stumps at 6:31 on a deflected shot from well out to make it 5-2 at 6:31.

Try as they might the Tanners could not organize an effective attack and Tergis skated off with the win.

Acton fans felt the Tanners got a bad game out of their systems. Fergus fans were jubilant. They predicted Flyers would walk off with the round robin in spite of being short-handed.

The Tanners were without Emerson Baxter, who, as a result of a "four knee" cartilage, is through with hockey this season.
