Council Meeting

Elmer Kerr New Building Inspector Three More Eramosa Posts Vacant

All members of Eramosa Township Council were present, with the reeve presiding, at a special meeting held in Rockwood town hall recently.

The township council gathered to interview applicants for the position of building inspector, as well as other general business. The minutes of their regular March meeting were read and adopted.

Three applicants for the position of building inspector were interviewed and it was moved by Mr. Cox and Mr. Hindley that Elmer B. Kerr, R.R. 1, Rockwood, be appointed as building inspector for the township of Eramosa. The remuneration is to be \$3.30 per hour plus 10¢ per mile travelled. Order commences March 14.

Applications

It was moved by Mr. Smith and Mr. Hindley and carried that the Clerk be authorized to advertise in the Guelph Daily Mercury for applications for the position of Clerk-Treasurer, collector and welfare officer for the township. Applications are to be in own handwriting, stating age, marital status, qualifications, experience

(if any) and character references. Applications are to be marked (application) on the outside of the envelope and sent to the township office in Rockwood by noon on Friday, April 3.

Moved by Mr. Forsythe and Mr. Smith that the Rockwood police village board be requested to secure prices for two horse loads for the township fire truck (mounted complete) and report to council as soon as convenient.

On a motion by councillors Hindley and Cox, and carried, the clerk was instructed to write to Woddy Russell, notifying him that a refund of \$10 on building permit No. 86-1963 will be paid when the permit is returned.

Write Department

Mr. Forsythe and Mr. Cox moved that the clerk be instructed to write to the Department of Municipal Affairs c/o John Pearson, asking particular on a fee being charged for educational purposes on each lot or parcel of land sold in the township. This was carried.

Garbage Collection

The question of garbage collection for the township was discussed at length and also the amount to be paid for wire fence posts.

It was decided that both matters be given further consideration at a future meeting.
