## B.P. Buys Cities Service Includes Oakville Plant

The British Petroleum Company Ltd. and Cities Service Company have signed a letter of Intent whereby British Petroleum will acquire the market and refining properties of Cities Service in the Provinces of Ontario and Quebec — including the new Oakville refinery.  
A joint announcement by The Hon. Sir Maurice Bridgeman, K.B.E., Chairman of British Petroleum, and Earl S. Watson, Chairman of Cities Service, stated that the transaction was dependent upon satisfactory consent of exchange control in United Kingdom and to approval by the Boards of Directors of each company.

Alberta.
