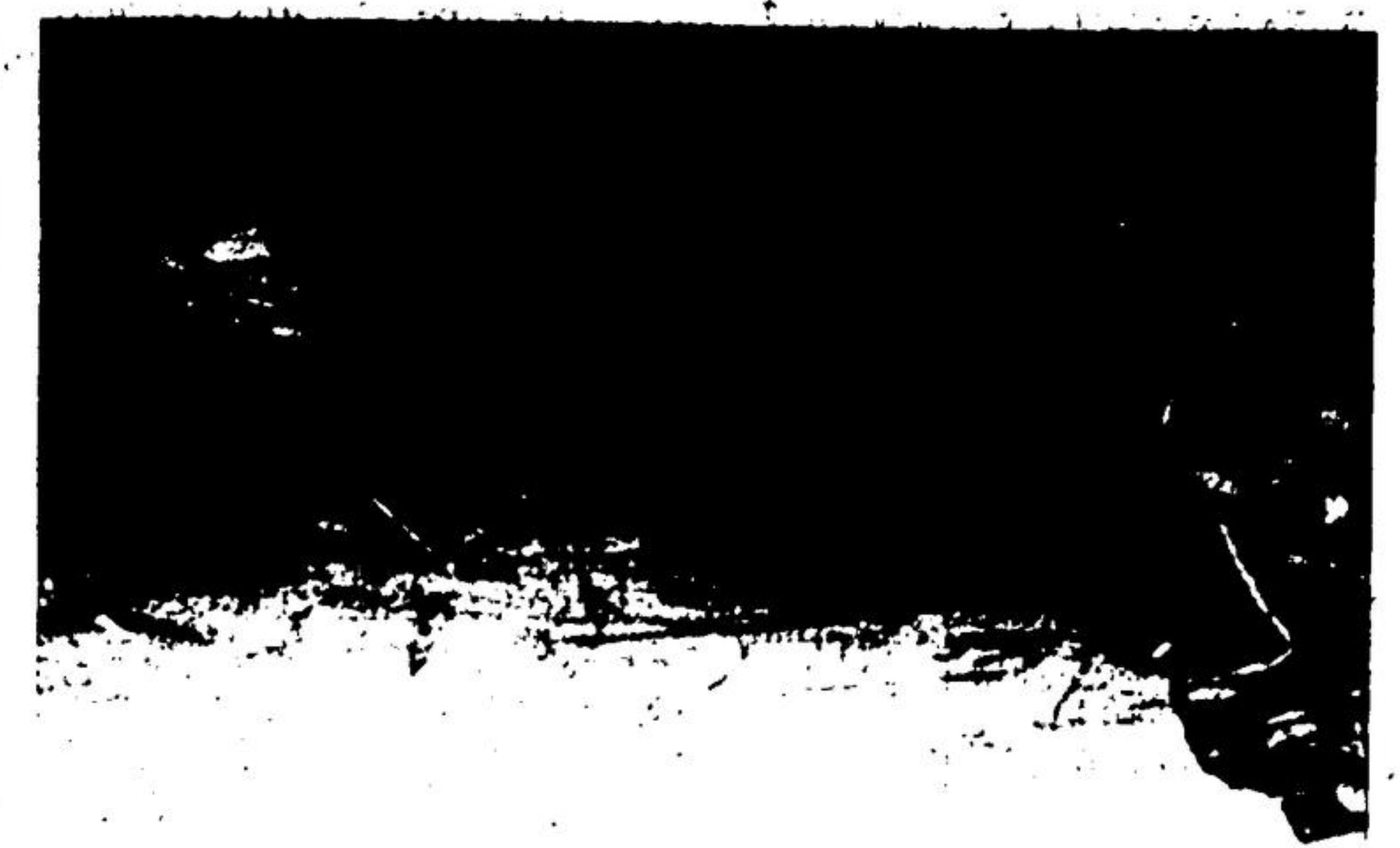
Golf Pro

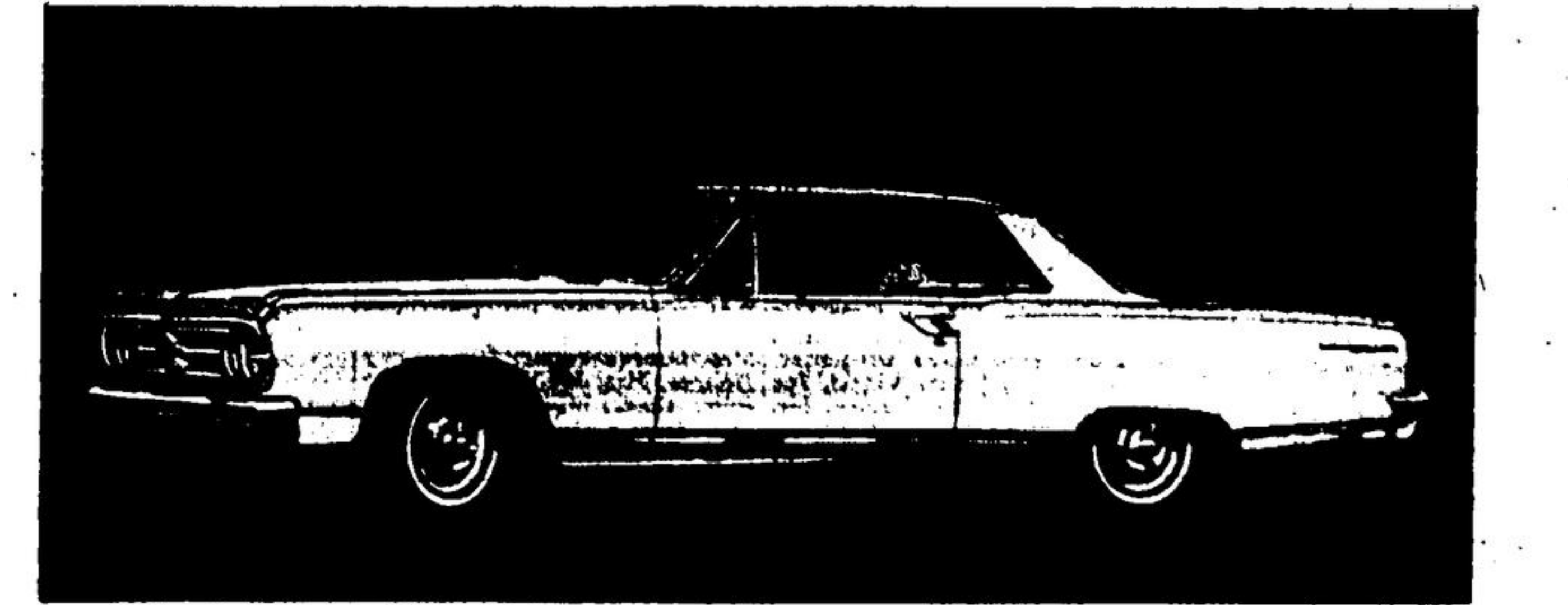
