## Seed, Hay Awards To District Farmers

A number of Rockwood district farmers were prize winners at the Wellington County Seed and Hay show held recently in Fergus. Among the successful exhibitors were Ernest and John Benham R.R. 3, Edgar and Harry Bonner R.R. 3, Fred and Harold Hawkin R.R. 3, Alex and Sandy McPherson R.R. 3, and George Leslie R.R. 1.

There were 95 entries in the seed competition and 87 in the hay classes.

Ernest and John Benham took the championship in silage and the reserve championship in the hay class.

## Wheat Men Approve Higher Levy 69.59% Favor Boost in Licence

The results of the recent vote by Ontario wheat producers on a proposed licence fee and levy increase found a clear majority of ballots in favor of the new proposal.

Roy Coulter of Lowville, chairman of the Ontario Wheat Producers' Marketing Board, said that the ballots processed by the Farm Products Marketing Board show 69.59 per cent of the total votes cast are in favor of the levy increase.

He stated that the Ontario Wheat Producers' Marketing Board is convinced beyond doubt that the vote conducted at county annual wheat meetings across

the province in February obtained the necessary voice of opinion by the producers which would enable their board to implement a more sound financial system.

**Need Operating Funds**

He also pointed out that as a result of the Wheat Board's credit crisis last fall, a greater operating capital is imperative to the continued success of the wheat producers' organization.

Mr. Coulter said that all wheat producers in the province were kept well informed of the credit crisis situation, of the various proposals studied by the Ontario Wheat Producers' Marketing Board, and finally of the vote itself.

This was accomplished through direct newsletters to all producers from the marketing board's office and through widespread news media coverage. All producers received notice of their respective annual meeting which outlined the issue to be voted upon at their meeting and of the voting procedure.

**Discussed First**

The procedure of casting ballots at county meetings, Mr. Coulter said, was favored in order that producers be afforded the opportunity to openly discuss the issue in each county prior to voting for or against.

Mr. Coulter explained that while it could not be expected that all 26,000 wheat producers of Ontario would attend the meetings, an unusually high number did turn out to the 31 meetings held.

Results of the vote were as follows: Total ballots cast: 1,161, 808 voted in favor and 353 voted against the proposal. The proposal presented was as follows:

That the Ontario Wheat Producers' Marketing Board deduct from licence fees and levy be increased from the present 10¢ per bushel (1¢ licence fee and 9¢ levy) to an amount not to exceed ten percent of the negotiated minimum price.

(At the present floor price of \$1.85, a total deduction of 16¢ per bushel would be possible.)

**Begin in July**

Mr. Coulter said that as a result of the favorable vote, it is presumed that the Ontario Wheat Producers' Marketing Board would implement the new deduction system at the beginning of the new crop year, July 1st, 1964.

However, he said, this is a decision to be made by the Ontario Wheat Producers' Marketing Board following proper approval by the government under the Marketing Act.

Mrs. Garbutt, the former Miss Mary Reid, taught at S.S. 9, Rockwood for many years and was highly respected by all.

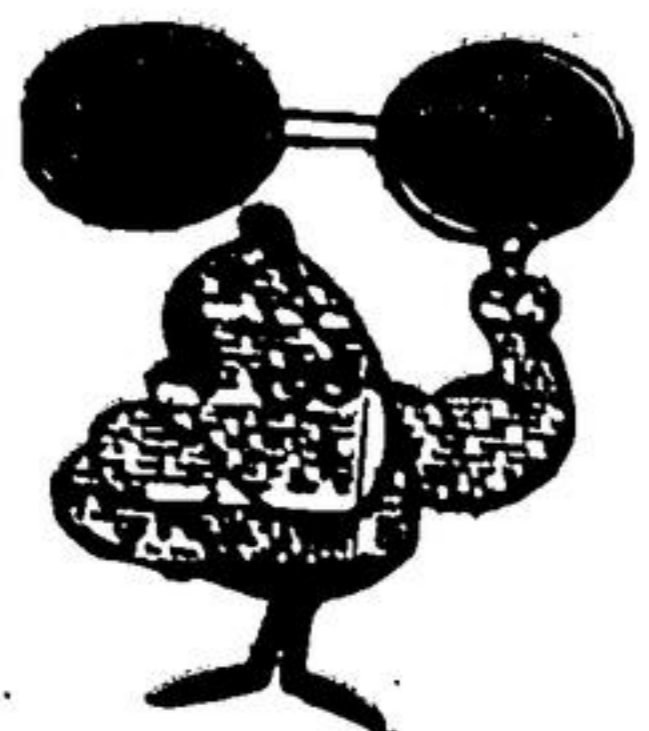
The sympathy of the community goes out to the bereaved couple and the hope of a speedy recovery for Mr. Garbutt, who was seriously injured in the crash.

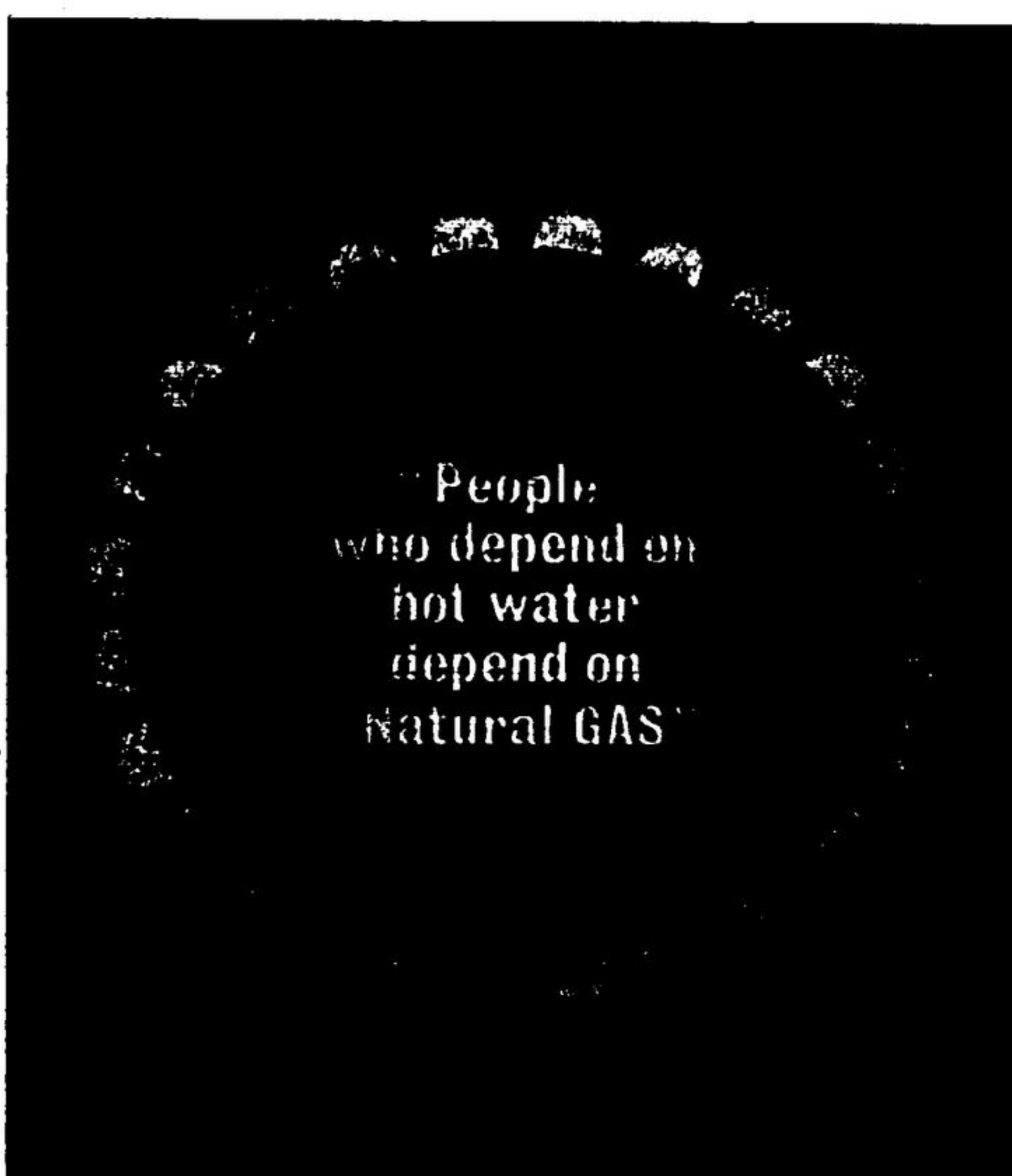
