Winter weather still gripped Christian Reformed church yesterday morning and evening service.

Action Baptist church had a Good Friday service, as well as morning and evening services on Easter Sunday. Evangel Baptist church also had morning and evening service.

The United Church, which usually has two services each Sunday morning, had 11 a.m. service Easter morning with the congregation filling the church.

There was a Good Friday service at 10 a.m. and sunrise service at 7:30 a.m. Easter Sunday with Young People's pancake breakfast attended by about 50 St. Joseph's Jammed.

At the service at St. Joseph's on Holy Thursday evening, men of the Holy Name Society kept vigil up to midnight. The Good Friday service was crowded. Another service was held on Holy Saturday.

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Harley Wants Ambulance Service Added to Hospital Ins. Coverage

A proposal in the House of Commons by Halton M.P. Dr. Harry Harley, to have emergency ambulance service included in the hospital insurance and diagnostic services act, was greeted coolly by fellow M.P.'s this week. An ambulance service has been a pipedream for a considerable time in Halton.

Dr. Harley suggested the act be amended to provide payment in agreement with the provinces and reviewed the various types of adequate and inadequate ambulance systems presently in operation in Canada. He noted, "what is needed first of all is legislation regarding minimum standards of vehicles, equipment and trained personnel."

By his proposal, the Halton M.P. wished to solve the financial problem surrounding ambulance services. "I am convinced that if we can solve the financial problems, the rest will straighten out themselves."

One member however, spoke out in favor of the proposed Carleton M.P. C. Lloyd Francis said, "I feel the honorable member who introduced the motion has done a great service in calling our attention to a serious

problem." The motion was talked out within the allotted hour and will probably not come up again this session.
