Norval Wins all Awards At Jr. Farmer Festival

Despite a scathing criticism of their work by adjudicator Mrs. Elva Newton of Campbellville, Halton Junior Farmers presented an entertaining evening of comedy and drama at their 1964 Drama Festival, held in Milton District High School auditorium Wednesday evening of last week.

The four plays — two by Norval club and one each from Milton and Acton Junior Farmer organizations — drew applause from the audience but were soundly criticized by the adjudicator. Mrs. Newton said all four plays were "trash" and unworthy choices for presentation at such a drama night. "There are 1,000 or more brilliant one-act plays to choose from, many of them good Canadian drama, and you should choose plays more worthy of the time and work you put into them," she scolded.

Awards to Norval
Mrs. W. Brain's direction and the Norval Junior Farmers' presentation of "The White Phantom" reaped all the awards of the festival, including the best actress and best actor awards. Mrs. Brain accepted the W. I. Dick trophy for best play from Kenneth Y. Dick. Judge G. E. Elliott presented the Margaret Alice Elliott trophy to Ruth Mason for her part as the excitable colored maid in the same play, and agricultural representative J. A. Francis awarded the J. E. Whitlock memorial trophy to Bruce Van Vliet for playing the slow-witted policeman in "Phantom".

Others in the play included Diane Wrigglesworth as the social climbing purchaser of a "haunted" house Gail McCallum as her daughter, Rita Van Arkel as the mobbish neighbor, John Wilson as the "ghost" and the real estate agent handling the sale, and Don Brander as the hero of the farce.

Best Play, But...
Mrs. Newton told the audience it was not an outstanding presentation, but the best of the four that were on stage that evening. The "Overtures" drama done by Milton Junior Farmers was the best choice of play, she felt, but was not presented as well as "Phantom".

The adjudicator also criticized the poor directing, poor carriage of voices, lack of scenery in all but one play, inept make-up, and poor accents of the actors.

Joy Hayward, president of Halton Junior Farmers, was chair-

man for the evening and called on each director to introduce their plays.

Mountain Family
Norval Juniors led off the evening with an uproarious comedy called "Feudin'", about a mountaineer family called Talbot caught up in the midst of love affairs and a long-standing feud with the Bascoms. It had a happy ending as a Bascom brought rain to the droughted Talbot farm and rode off into the sunset with a Talbot girl as his bride.

Mrs. Brain directed this play also, with Howson Ruddell assisting. The actors included Margaret Alexander, Marilyn Wrigglesworth, Stanley Hyatt, Graham Reeve, Betty Ann Eyre, Keith Ella and Gail McCallum. Acton's play this year was "Daffy Danny", about a boy who

plays dumb to win back his girl friend's affections from a rival suitor Leon Duffield was directed and Duncan Currie, Doris Robinson, Paul McNabb and John Jarvis played the parts.

Society Types
The Milton entry, directed by David Martin, had an all-girl cast, with Carol McCarron and Dillian Finnie as society girls who both unknowingly attempt to have one's husband paint a portrait of the other. Janette Finnie and Judie Dobbie played their "inner selves" and prompted the real-life women in the play, called "Overtures".

The Norval "Phantom" cast will be presenting the play again at Dundas on April 6 when they enter the zone Junior Farmer drama festival as Halton's representatives. A crowd of close to 300 attended the evening.

M.P.P. John Root Speaks on Bill

Wellington-Dufferin M.P.P. John Root was among the many who spoke during the debate in the House on the controversial Bill No. 99 to the Standing committee on labor, legal and municipal bills. Hansard shows Mr. Root speaking at some length, and often interrupted.

"He concluded, 'I think it will be in the interests of all concerned if this bill goes to the committee, where people who have views to express can express them. We will get all sides of the story and if the bill comes back to the House, we will deal with it. If it dies in committee, it will die in committee. If it is amended, we will deal with the amendment.'"

Mr. Root explained he had met many of the public in his riding on the previous weekend in Guelph and Kitchener, at a seed fair, presentation and church opening. He claimed there was a deliberate attempt on the weekend "to inflame the passions of people and distract the intentions of legislation" by press and radio. "In my riding, we are not so easily brainwashed," he added.

\$35,932 Contributions Halton Christmas Seals

Halton residents gave the second highest per capita contribution in Canada in the recent Halton Tuberculosis and Health Association campaign. It was announced this week.

The Halton group collected \$35,932 or 29.3 cents per person, executive secretary Mrs. M. E. Lunau of Oakville announced. The Christmas seal campaign last year returned \$14,874.

Members reminded the public that World Health Day will be celebrated on Tuesday, April 7 this year, and "No Truce for TB" is the theme. Mrs. C. McKim of Bronte points out there were 6,284 new cases of TB discovered in Canada in 1962, and 1,226 of those were in Ontario. The group conducts frequent chest X-ray clinics to root out the disease among Halton citizens and free monthly chest clinics (paid for by Christmas seal contributions) are held in all Halton County hospitals.
