**Co-Op Medical Service**  
**Names B. Cross Manager**

Bryn J. Cross of Milton has been appointed Manager of Halton Co-Operative Medical Services, it was announced today by Samuel R. Finnie, president.

Mr. Cross has been a resident of Milton for eight years. For the past six years he has represented National Life in this area, and prior to that was engaged at Orenda Engines, Milton. He has recently been closely associated with Milton Chamber of Commerce where he served in various capacities, as well as handling the Chamber's medical insurance plan.

It was explained Mr. Cross will continue his work with National Life while serving as Manager of the Co-Op Medical service.

**New Secretary**  
In the second announcement this week, Mrs. Fred Edwards of R.R. 1, Campbellville was named office secretary. She takes the place of Mrs. A. R. Coulter of Campbellville who recently resigned.

Halton Co-Op Medical Services was granted a charter as a corporation offering pre-paid hospital insurance of rural and settled people in 1947. Volunteer workers and organizers soon had recruited a membership of 1,100 covering over 3,000 people. In 1962 the service was extended to provide surgical benefits and since 1954 the organization has provided benefits for catastrophic illnesses.

**Add Comprehensive**  
When Ontario Hospital Insurance came into being in 1959 the organization was forced to vacate the Hospitalization field, but remained as a collection agency for the O.H.S.C. as a service to members. The major Medical Fund was added to the Surgical Benefits in 1959. Then in 1963 service was expanded again to provide a Comprehensive Plan to cover additional home and office calls, hospital visits, injections.

During 1963, the service processed \$27,225 worth of claims plus \$5,444 in major medical claims, and had earned premium income of \$33,590. The plans presently cover 1,667 persons, with 696 memberships and 350 enrolled in the Comprehensive plan. X-ray coverage has been added as of March 1 this year, and directors are studying inclusion of chiropractic and optometric benefits.

The service is still owned and controlled by its members, and provides a service at cost. Directors serve on a voluntary basis. It was emphasized the plans are open for enrolment all year long, not just at certain times of the year.
