The school was sold by the Dept. of Highways, who bought it for road-widening purposes.

Limehouse Women's Institute held their annual meeting on April 2 in the Memorial Hall commencing at 12:30 when a delicious pot luck lunch was enjoyed. The business meeting with Mrs. Roughley presiding opened at 2 p.m. with all repeating the Mary Stewart Collect in unison. Roll call was payment of fees, which have been raised this year to \$1.00.

Reports for the year were read by the secretary-treasurer, Mrs. Ted Brown and showed a tidy balance on hand. Business was attended to and reports for the year were read. All conveners had their annual reports ready to forward on to the district conveners. The president, Mrs. Roughley, presented her usual wonderful report, which all looked forward to hearing.

She reviewed the past six years of her term of office. Some of the highlights were the purchasing of a 72 cup coffee urn by selling boxes of Christmas cards; in 1959, the hall was decorated and new drapes were made to finish off the decorating.
