### Model Plane Club Members Plan First Annual "Fly-In"

Have you heard what sounds like several buzz saws breaking the stillness of a Saturday or Sunday afternoon? Don't think trees are being lopped down—it's just the Acton Hi-Flayers testing their model planes at either the school grounds or park.

Back in September 1961, high school teacher Oscar Drijber, himself an experienced pilot during the War, formed the club with students from the school. The main purpose of the club was to assist students with certain subjects such as geography, sciences, mathematics, languages, mechanics and industrial arts by the use of slide rules and computers, explanation of the different instruments and the way they work, reading of maps and study of terrain and construction of model planes.

Assistance for the club is received from the Department of Transport, particularly the Civil Aviation Branch; the R.C.A.F. and its associations, several commercial air services and some flying clubs.

Presently the club is well organized with president Peter Pukler, who holds a private pilot's license, vice-president David Woodhouse, secretary Bill Reed and treasurer Jim Jennings. Oscar Drijber acting in an advisory capacity.

The members meet twice a month at the school and after a business meeting adjourn outdoors where model planes are checked over, motors revved up and planes take to the air for flights.

Plenty of ingenuity goes into the construction of the models and members not only purchase kits which they make up but design their own models from ideas gathered up.

On May 2, members will hold their first annual "Fly-In" at which time model airplane club members from various other places will be invited to attend. Action begins at 10 a.m. and will continue until everyone either gets tired of whirling round and round as their planes soar through the air or darkest sets in.

Beside the executive members others include Rick Ironside, John DeBlauw, Lynn Perry, Stewart Reed, David Chapman, Paul Noble, Ian Stone, Doug Stone (father of Ian), Fred Collins and Chris Kranendonk.

**The Bible Today**

"How to read the whole Bible in one year" is one of the themes of the Canadian Bible Society during the sixtieth anniversary of the Society in Canada. A simple plan has been suggested by the Reverend Professor A. R. Cragg of Winnipeg which is recommended by the Bible Society for use through 1964.

In order to read the 1,189 chapters of the Bible in one year, says Prof. Cragg, each morning read one chapter and each evening throughout the year, read two chapters. On Sundays until the end of September two additional chapters should be read, that is, five chapters instead of the usual three. On the Sundays of the last three months of the year, four chapters a day should be read.

This plan is the result of many requests for suggestions as to how to read the whole Bible in one year. Other plans have been prepared such as: "Read three pages a day." There are approximately 1,000 pages in the average Bible.

Many people regularly read the Bible from Genesis to Revelation each year. One successful man in Toronto has done this for some 30 years. A gentleman in Chicago after reading it through each year for a number of years decided to write the whole Bible out by hand in order that its message might impress itself more clearly on his hand.
