HALTON COUNCIL BRIEFS

On Tuesday members of Halton County Council:

- Approved recommendations of the C.N.R. for installation of reflectorized crossing signs and manual flagging for trains at the Base Line crossing north of Milton.

- Declined to support a resolution from the Credit Valley Conservation Authority regarding relief in the municipal assessments and tax levies on swamp lands.

- Agreed to participation of the Emergency Measures Organization in the village of Campbellville's Jubilee celebration in June.

- Received tentative approval from the Bank of Nova Scotia to credit of \$1,000,000 for financing the extension to Halton Central Manse. In view of amended cost estimates application was to be made to increase the credit to \$1,400,000.

- Referred back to a committee a suggestion that no fees or expenses be paid to members of council attending outside the county on county business without prior authorization of council. Members receive a fee of \$20 daily for meetings plus mileage costs.

- Authorized the clerk-administrator to attend a Seminar at Queen's University in May and payment of the registration fee of \$275.

- Agreed to development of an additional parking lot at the County Administration building at the south east corner. An amount of \$400 was provided and the lot is to be stoned.

- Were advised a meeting was being planned to study the earlier suggestion of Family Court Judge K. Langdon that a half-way house be established.

- Received a quarterly report from the warden outlining his activities and the functions attended during the first three months of the year.

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Grant Cut Draws Deputy's Ire Meals for Sailors, No Program

A cut in a requested grant to the Oakville Yacht Squadron from \$750 to \$450 drew the ire of Oakville's Deputy Reeve Lester Whitling at the regular meeting of Halton County Council on Tuesday.

The reduced grant was proposed in the report of the finance and welfare committee, and the deputy reeve asked why it had been reduced.

Oakville's Reeve Herb Merry, chairman of the finance committee, admitted he was on the spot, but suggested the request had not been received until considerably after the county budget had been set. "I would like to have seen them get the \$750, but I was glad to get the \$450," he concluded.

No Program

The grant to the squadron was to assist in financing regattas being held in Oakville in August for western hemisphere Snipe

Sailing championships. The grant represented the cost of dinners for 60 persons for three days at \$450, together with \$300 for assist in printing programs. The county approved the cost of dinners but declined to contribute to the program.

Deputy Reeve Whitling recalled that earlier this year \$500 had been approved for the Halton Agricultural Society and other farm groups benefited from grants. "This \$750 would be a contribution to the good name of the municipality," he argued.

Deputy Reeve F. Rogers, Burlington noted the two southern municipalities paid 80 to 85 per cent of county costs and he was sure Burlington would be willing to increase the grant to the squadron. He suggested the county would receive some good advertising from the event.

On a motion to increase the grant, however, only Burlington and Oakville supported the move and the grant remained at \$450.

Later Deputy Reeve Whitling observed he had reported to Oakville council on county activities and he undertook to speak on the Mayor. He was surprised to learn that only 34 residents were from Oakville despite Oakville's contribution to county costs.

All Welcomes

"Wherever in Halton people come from, they're welcome," Reeve Elliott of Georgetown observed.

"It's not the welcome I'm questioning," Deputy Reeve Whitling observed as he noted no one north of 10 Sidemore had seen fit to support his motion for the higher grant to the Oakville Yacht Squadron.
