6,400 from 44 Schools Participate In Halton Music Festivals in 1964

The 1964 Halton Music Festivals were judged "the best ever" at the annual meeting of the Festival Association, held in Milton Wednesday evening of last week. The North Halton and South Halton festivals saw a total of 6,400 students from 44 public and separate schools participating, secretary Mrs. D. E.

Martin of Milton announced in her annual report to the meeting. K. F. Trowbridge, principal of Brookville School and president of the festival, presided over the meeting. Others in attendance included South Halton president Mrs. Charles Bragg and other

festival supporters from the various schools concerned. **Spring Festival** A decision was made to hold the festival again in the spring of next year. In the meantime all trophies are to be checked over and repaired if necessary. Discussion was held on marking Canada's 100th centennial with innovations during the festival, and opinions of the schools are to be asked. The possibilities of competitions for musical instruments, special centennial crests for participants, and a massed choir concert were offered as suggestions.

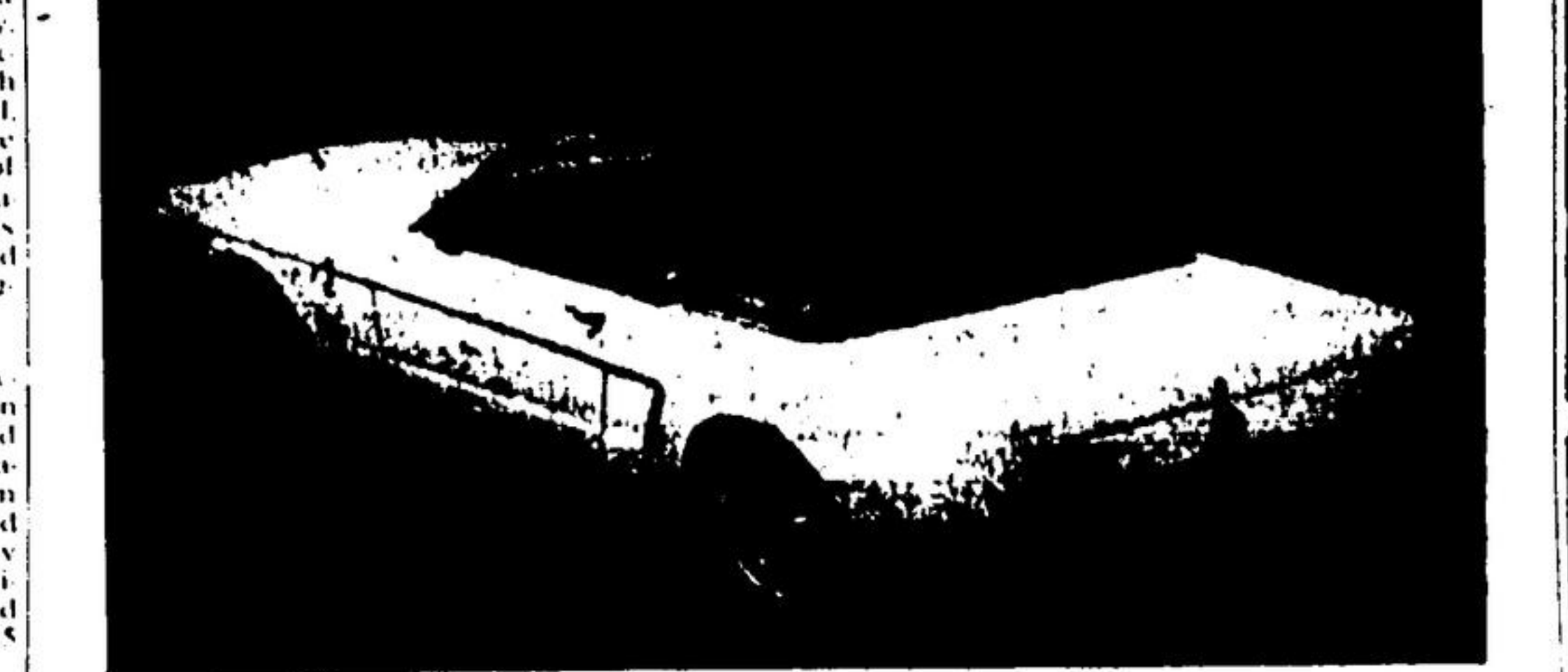
W.M.S. Meets
