Spring planting time is here again. And with it comes the old refrain, "What shall we plant this year, my dear, To bring our home a bit of cheer?"

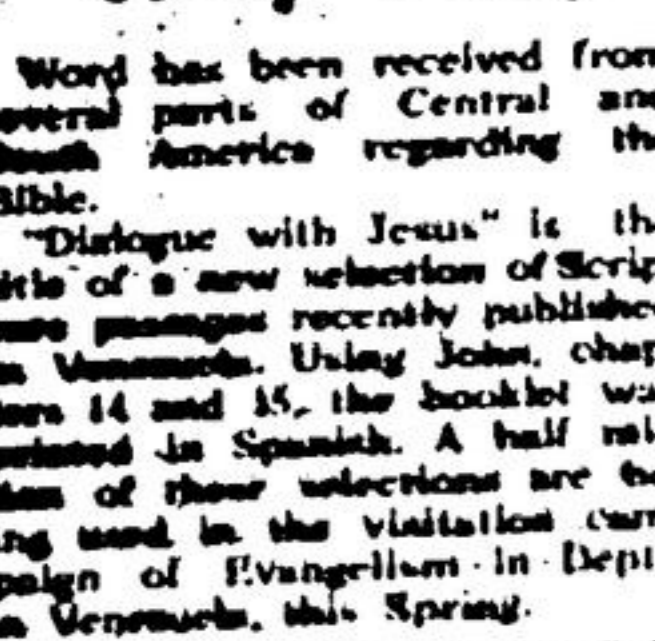
Will it be roses — floribunda or tea, Or should we add another shade tree? There are poplar and maple, elm and ash. Now mind you, this project needs plenty of cash.

Word has been received from several parts of Central and South America regarding the Bible. "Dialogue with Jesus" is the title of a new selection of Scripture passages recently published in Venezuela. Using John, chapters 14 and 15, the booklet was prepared in Spanish. A half million of these selections are being used in the visitation (home) program of Evangelism in Depth in Venezuela, this Spring.

"The Light of the Amazon" is the name of the Bible Society's book which recently completed a month-long tour during which 60,000 Scripture portions were distributed. The Society in Brazil reports a nationwide distribution of over five million copies in 1963.

The Book of the Month in Central America, in January, was the Gospel of Mark. Promoted by the Bible Societies, the object is to get people to read the Scriptures more systematically. The fact that the various Books of the Bible are available in various languages and versions is advertised widely in connection with this project.
