### Include Halton County in Survey On Massive Transportation Study

The Ontario government this week launched a massive survey of the transportation requirements of the 3,000 square mile Metropolitan Toronto region. Highway Minister C. S. MacNaughton announced in a statement before the Legislature. The survey will include Halton County.

It will provide information for a study of present and future means of travel, including possible implementation of an experimental railway commuter service between Burlington and Ajax.

**Largest Survey**  
In announcing the project, the Minister said it was the largest and most comprehensive transportation survey ever undertaken in Canada. He said it would involve many thousands of interviews before its completion late this year.

The region under survey extends from Hamilton eastward to Bowmanville, a distance of approximately 70 miles, and 50 miles northward to Barrie. It contains over 70 municipalities and more than 2,000,000 people, making it the heaviest populated section of the province.

**Plans Interviews**  
Interviews with householders are now being carried out to gather the information required. The survey is being carried out under the direction of the Metropolitan Toronto and Region Transportation Study, an organization established over a year ago by the government to investigate and report on an overall transportation policy for the region.

The rail commuter survey is a further step in an earlier study of the potential use of 15 railway lines radiating in all directions from the downtown Toronto area said Mr. MacNaughton.

**Rapid Transit**  
He recalled that the earlier study had shown that use could be made of 280 miles of these lines for public transportation, and that about 80 miles could be adapted for frequent rail commuter and rapid transit use.
