

AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Council and Ratepayers of the Township of Nassagaweya.

Dear Sirs:
We have made an examination of the books and accounts of the Township of Nassagaweya and its associated boards and commissions for the year ended December 31, 1963. Our examination has been conducted in accordance with the instructions of the Department of Municipal Affairs and there is attached, a completed questionnaire dealing with specific auditing requirements.

The Statement of Revenues and Expenditures "D" shows that the Township had a surplus on the current year's operations of \$5,965.68. This surplus has been added to the accumulated surplus of the Township which now stands at \$15,265.44. A comparison with the budget of the various items of revenue and expenditure is attached. An abnormal amount of supplementary tax was collected in the year because of the assessment on the race track — but only \$2,519.94 of this was available for Township purposes and the balance is due to the Schools and County.

A reference to the current Balance Sheet "B" shows:
(1) There is recoverable from the Bonding Company because of the bankruptcy of a road contractor, \$9,797.41. This is increased in 1964 to \$13,307.12 through additional expenditures after the year end — we have no confirmation from the Bonding Company accepting this claim.

(2) Taxes receivable stand at \$50,141.21, an increase of \$10,926.24 from a year ago. We suggest special attention be given to these in an effort to reduce the amount unpaid.

(3) There is owing to schools, \$24,060.06. This is their share of the supplementary tax which had not been paid on by December 31, as is required by regulation. There is also owing to the County, \$3,928.74, which should have been paid prior to December 31.

(4) The reserve for Working Funds now stands at \$21,000.00.

AUDITOR'S OPINION

Subject to a possible loss in the collection of the claim on the Bonding Company, we hereby report that in our opinion:

1. The financial transactions which have come under our notice have been within the powers of the Municipality.
2. The audit has been conducted in accordance with the instructions of the Department of Municipal Affairs.

3. The financial statements present fairly the financial position of the Municipality as at December 31, 1963, and the results of its operation for year ended on that date.

Fire Loss Up

Major fires in the five largest communities in Halton County increased by 20 last year over the five-year average figure of 177, according to figures released in the 1963 annual report of the Ontario Fire Marshall.

The total of 397 major fires in Acton, Milton, Oakville, Burlington and Georgetown, was an increase of 20 over the five-year average figure. They also caused a \$5,000 rise to \$757,336 over the five-year average property loss figure of \$752,335.

The largest fire during 1963 was the \$149,547 blaze that levelled the century-old Robin Hood Flour Mill. The second largest fire destroyed property and products valued at \$60,000, at Com Vac-Hyd processing Ltd. in Oakville. Here are the 1963 figures:
