Friends are very sorry to learn Miss Madge Chapman is a patient in Guelph General Hospital and hope for a prompt recovery.

About 1,600 attended a presentation and tea Sunday in the auditorium of the nurses' residence of St. Michael's Hospital, Toronto, in honor of Miss Grace Murphy, who is retiring after nursing 39 years at the hospital. In the evening Miss Murphy was a fellow student nurse and staff nurse, Miss Madeline Gibbons of Acton, who with Miss Murphy was one of the first graduate nurses on the staff.

Over 40 rainbow trout were brought back to town by several parties fishing on opening weekend at the Beaver River, Thornbury. Fishing was good, although about a thousand congregate on the town and all hotel and motel accommodation was full for miles around. The Shepherd party from Acton got 28 trout. Bus Chisholm and Doug Shepherd each got half a dozen. One of Buck's Oakley's weighed over 10 pounds.

Recreation director Jim Cavanaugh, who expected a D.S.T. Standard Time difference to give him a ten-minute flight to Windsor last Thursday, actually made the trip in five minutes! He was attending the Ontario Recreation Association conference, which included professionals as well as laymen, for a total of 365. Coordination and cooperation in planning recreational services in a municipality was greatly stressed. Everyone, he says, agreed wholeheartedly that there must be more co-operation in building of facilities and the planning of programs including authorities, schools, agencies and churches, to provide the most and prevent duplication. Use of school facilities was discussed as well as Y.M.C.A. and churches. The Department of Education favors use of schools for night schools and recreation.

One thousand or more Presbyterian women from across Canada will meet in the Church of St. Andrew and St. Paul, Montreal, on May 8, 9 and 10. It will be the largest women's rally in the history of the Presbyterian Church in Canada. Attending from Acton are Mrs. A. H. McKenzie, Mrs. Harry Maloprice and Miss Ruby Clark, who leave Thursday night with a group from Guelph Presbyterian. Delegates will celebrate 100 years of Presbyterian women's work in Canada and the 50th anniversary of the amalgamation of three societies into the Women's Missionary Society, Western Division. There is still a separate Eastern Division in the Maritime areas which will be represented. From From India, Miss Margaret Kennedy will fly home especially to give the three main addresses on the society's motto, "The World for Christ." Another guest speaker will be Rev. Dr. Kenneth G. MacMillan, general secretary of the Canadian Bible Society. The 45,000 members of the W.M.S. have already over-subscribed four special projects to mark the occasion, in addition to their annual budget. They are: \$18,000 for the new Fellowship House in Winnipeg, \$10,000 for a nurses' residence in Jhat, India, \$7,500 for a Christian education building in Tagpet, Formosa, and \$2,500 for the Hsin Chu Bible School in Formosa.

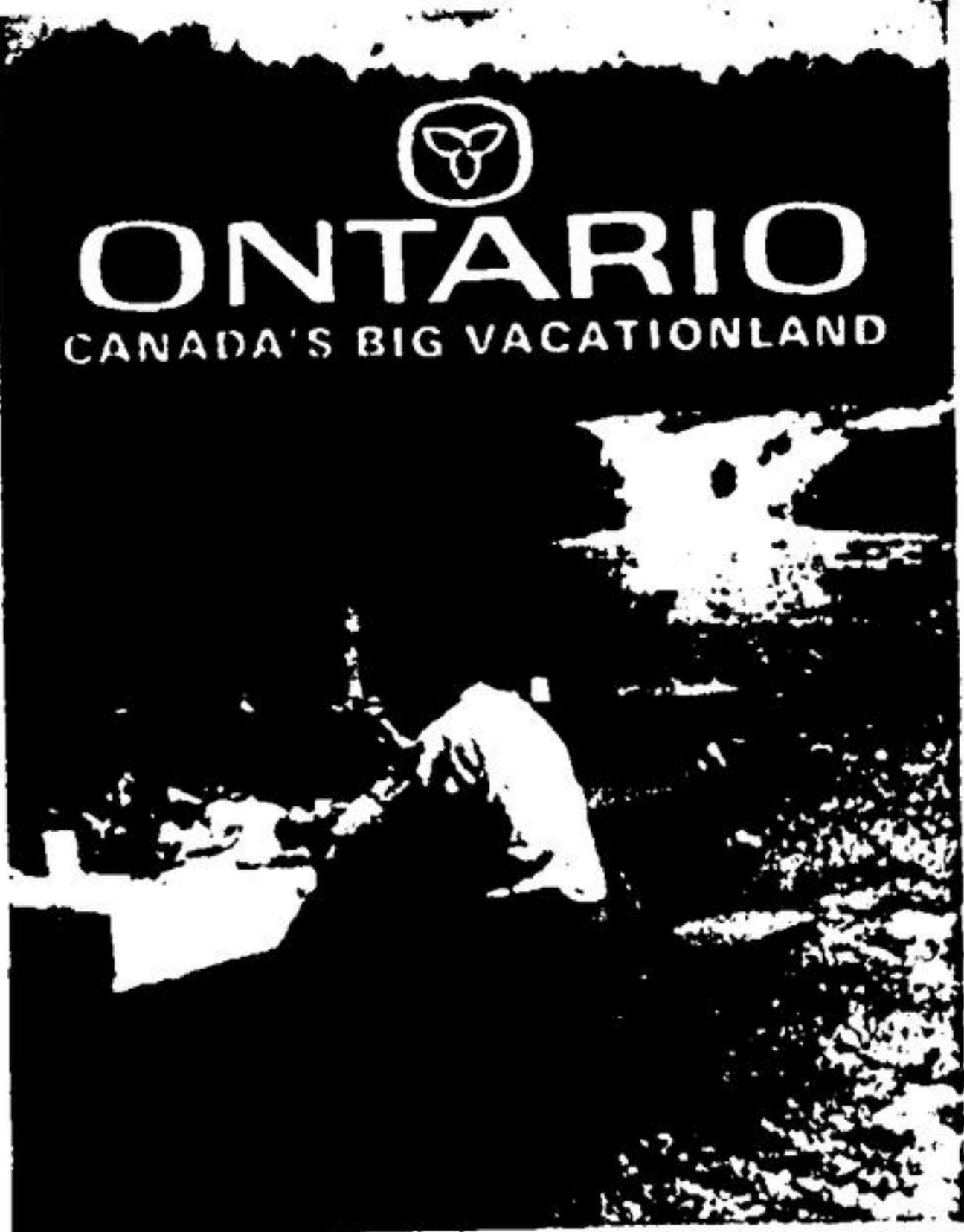
Retiring Beardmore Employee Gets Plane Ticket to Scotland

Off to Good Start Teachers all Hired

High school board members learned Monday evening a complete slate of teachers had been hired for next term. Trustee Douglas Engel, chairman of the management committee, said "The teaching staff represents considerable increase in both qualifications and experience."

Chairman Jack Reid commended the committee on its prompt action and said it was the earliest the board had ever completed hiring a full teaching staff. Mr. Engel suggested there should be a smooth start for school next fall as the principal and staff had plenty of time to set up schedules and time tables.

Trustee Duncan Moffat said "I hope this reflects on results next year."

Addition Ready
Trustee Chester Anderson wondered if the board was satisfied the new addition would be ready for occupancy next fall and the chairman remarked "Certain it will until someone is handed the keys." Mr. Anderson then wondered if any arrangements had been made with the public school board to rent the stone school in the event the new addition was not ready.

Mr. Engel told the board the lab equipment at the stone school would be dismantled during the summer ready to move into the new building. Members wondered if four of the eight rooms could be entirely completed first to accommodate students who would normally be attending classes at the stone school.

Tender Transport
Chairman of transportation Duncan Moffat told the board the contract for school buses should be tendered next year as there had been complaints last year when this was not done. Secretary William Middleton informed the members according to regulations transportation must be tendered every five years.

The board also instructed the secretary to cover the new addition with insurance while still in construction.

Approved accounts totalling \$14,600 for payment.

Agreed to rent a safety deposit box at the bank for safekeeping of bonds and insurance policies.
