Nixes Market Plan Without Egg Vote

The Ontario Poultry Producers' Association had requested the government, through the Ontario Farm Products Marketing Board to establish a plan without a vote on a two-year trial basis.

"After study of the request it would appear from the meagre attendance at the various meetings held to discuss the proposal, that there is no pronounced sucport for the plan," said Mr. Stewart, "There has been no great degree of public support being evidenced at this time. It cannot be assumed that all those producers who stayed at home during the discussions were in favor of the plan or even against it."






