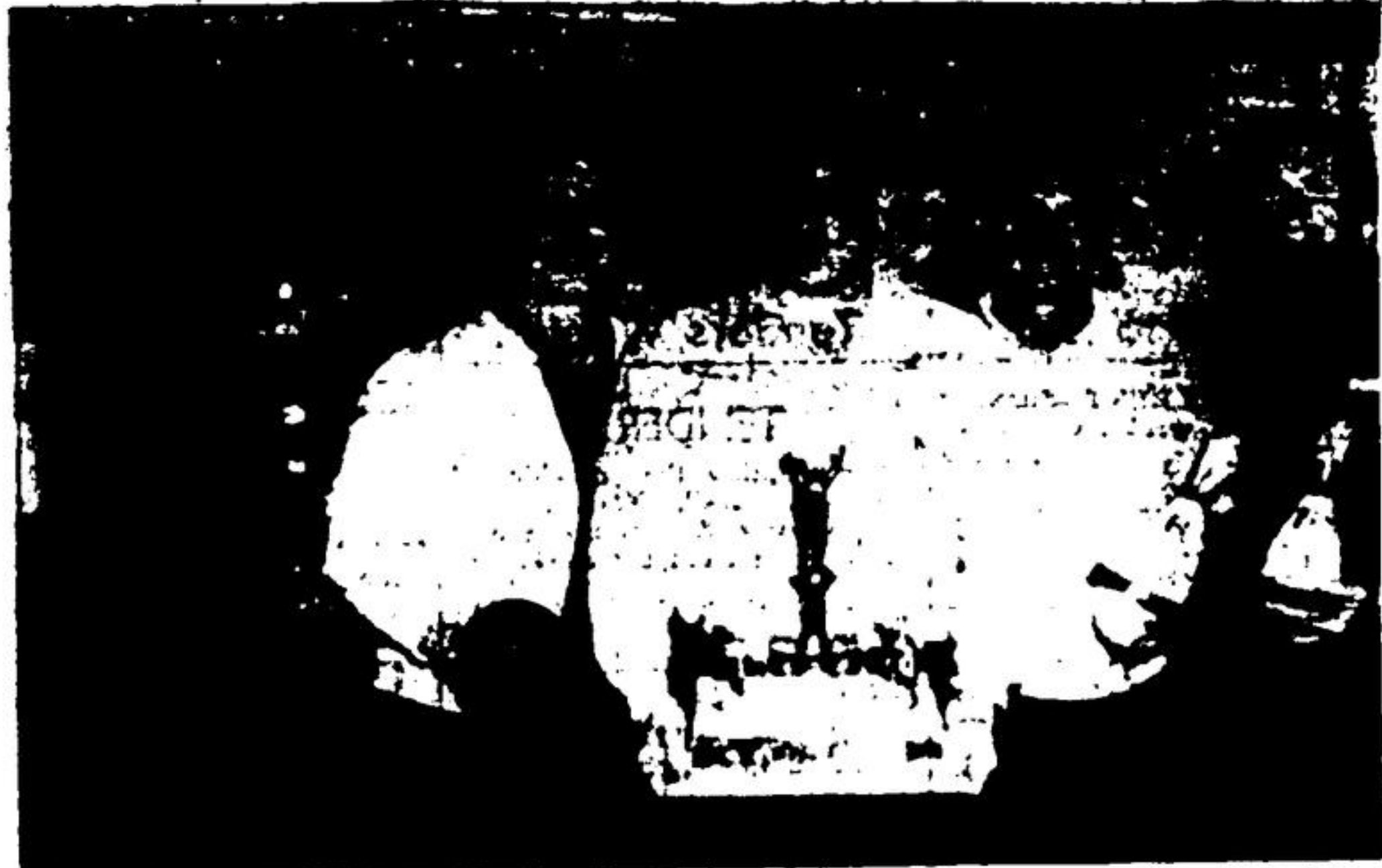
Reception

Talks, Tour, Citizenship Papers Highlights of Rotary "Adventure"

For me, the 1964 "Adventure in Citizenship" began with my arrival at Ottawa Airport on Sunday. There I was met by my host, Mr. Ronald C.
