The County Board of the Halton Junior Farmers was held on May 6th in the board rooms of the agricultural office in Milton.

In addition to representatives from each of the four Junior Farmer Clubs in Halton, there was in attendance, Mrs. K. Costam, Home Economist for the Counties of Halton and Peel, the newly appointed Agricultural Representative for these Counties, Henry Stanley, and his summer assistant, Bruce Huff from Prince Edward County.

President, Joy Hayward, began the session by expressing her thanks to each of the Juniors who took part in the Church Service recently held. Collection from this church service will be divided equally between the church it was held at and the Crippled Children's campaign.

The local County Field Day is to be held on June 20th, with the place undetermined as yet. A committee consisting of Tom Hunter, Marion Hunter, Allan Hayward and Lillian Finnie, was chosen to decide where it is to be held, and to draw up a schedule for the day. Entries for the events are to be brought to the next County board meeting.

FIRE CODE.
Adoption of the National Fire Code in every Halton municipality, was one topic of discussion Tuesday evening at a meeting of Halton Mutual and Fire Services Association Members.

Members also discussed the possibility of finding a central training grounds for training firefighters from the county. A meeting of the five fire chiefs will be attempted to iron out the details.

Safety Council to Sponsor Car Checks for Three Days

A mobile safety lane check will visit Acton June 1, 2 and 3, sponsored by Acton Safety Council and the Department of Transport. This is the first time it has been held here.

Purpose of the safety lane check is to give drivers an opportunity to have their cars given a 38 point safety check. It's hoped some future accidents can be prevented by spotting possible sources of trouble in advance.

The check your car gets in this lane is more thorough than the police can give in routine, including tests that have to be made by special equipment. Included are alignment, camber, toe-in, brakes and steering. The complete front end will be gone over by the inspectors.

Sticker for Windshield
If your car's all right, you get a sticker for the front window — the same kind given in police spot checks. If the car doesn't pass, certain recommendations will be made and there is no obligation of course the operators and Safety Council hope you'll get the weak points attended to — for your safety and that of others — and you may be back for another successful check before the crew moves on to another town.

Only obligation is for motorists who might be sent for checkups by the police. They will require a clean bill of health for the vehicle afterwards, or repairs undertaken.
