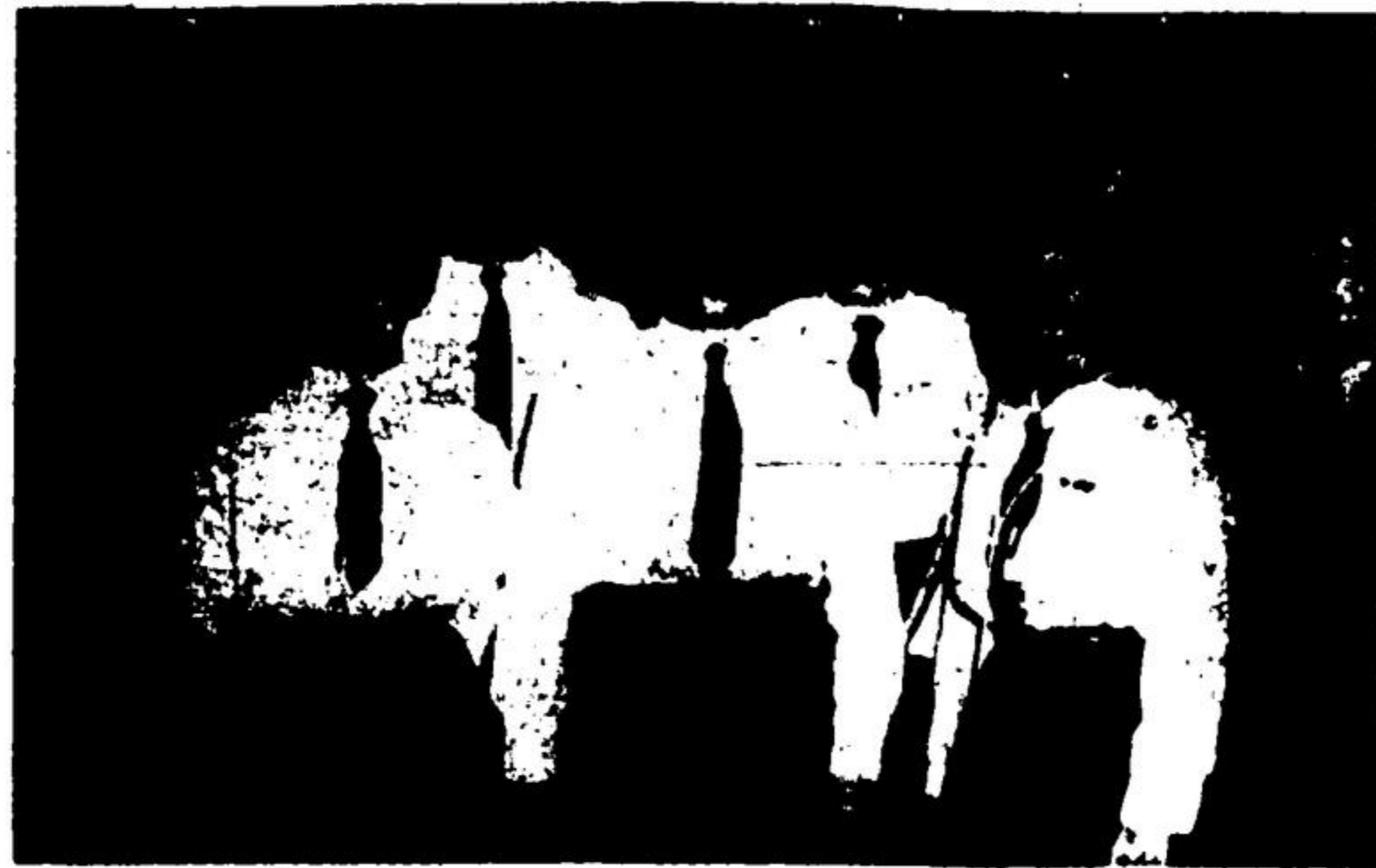
Ball practice is to begin on May 20th at Pinegrove school.

OBITUARY

Ivan M. Kirkness School Principal

Ivan M. Kirkness, age 51, principal of Queen Elizabeth public school in Kitchener, died Sunday, May 24, following a brief illness. He resided at 36 Valewood Place. He was born in Bracebridge, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Peter Kirkness.

He began his teaching career in Port Sydney in 1911. He went to Kitchener in 1917 and taught at Courtland Avenue, King Edward, Victoria and Carmichael. He was appointed principal of Sunnyside school in 1952. He then continued to serve as principal of Smithton, Courtland Avenue and King Edward school.

He was a member of Highland Baptist church, and a former deacon of the church. He served with the R.C.A.F. from 1941 to 1945.

He is survived by the former Laura McMullen, a son Peter of Kitchener, a brother Charles of Acton, and a sister Marie G. Kirkness of Kitchener.

The funeral was conducted Wednesday at 3 p.m. at the Ratz Bechtel Funeral Home, Kitchener, by the Rev. W. L. Pierce. Interment was in Fairview Cemetery, Acton.
