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Insure Summer of Fun, Pleasure Make Sure Boats are Seaworthy

Over the first holiday weekend of the boating season thousands of cottages have been opened up for the first time all over Ontario. Plans are being made for a summer of relaxation and enjoyment on our wonderful waterways. The Ontario Safety League would like to remind everyone that only the right approach to the use of boats, motors and water skills will insure a summer of fun and pleasure unmarred by tragedy.

The first step is to inspect the hull of your boat thoroughly to be sure it is in seaworthy condition, and if not, make the necessary repairs before putting it in the water. Then check over your motor and all safety equipment, making necessary repairs and replacements. Remember that the Law requires a pair of oars or paddles, a bailing bucket or bilge pump and a government approved lifejacket or life-saving cushion for each passenger in the average outboard powered boat.

And just a word of warning. If your lifejackets or cushions are not in good condition replace them even if they are government approved. Mousing and anchor lines are important pieces of equipment for the safety of both craft and passengers. If they are not in good condition buy new ones.

It is advisable to carry an approved fire extinguisher in any gasoline powered craft even if your boat is not of the size and

type where it is required by law. Carbon tetrachloride extinguishers are no longer acceptable for use on pleasure boats. An adapter could save you lost time and embarrassment.

If you are operating your boat at night it is important that navigation lights are in good condition and burning, red and green lights in the bow and a white light showing all around the horizon on the stern.

The second step in insuring your pleasure and enjoyment for the summer is to know the Rules of the Road and Right-of-Way

and practice them. This knowledge combined with common sense and courtesy on the water will make for a boating season of fun and safety.
