HALTON COUNCIL BRIEFS

At their regular meeting on Tuesday afternoon, Halton County Council:

• Learned that 204 residents had occupied the Manor during the month of May.

• Were informed that construction has commenced on the elevator at the Manor and learned that the discovery of an old catch basin below the grade would be an extra cost to the contract.

• Were advised that reflectorized sign boards would be erected at the crossing of the C.N.R. on the Base Line just west of Ontario St. All future rail movements over the crossing are to be flagged by a member of the train crew and all trains are to stop before entering the crossing.

• Approved Take-Over: Were advised that the request by County Council to take over the maintenance of the Road to Kelso Dam was approved by the Department of Highways.

• Learned approval has been given by the Department of Highways to the Council's request to authorize a speed limit of 35 miles per hour on a section of the Base Line near Peru, following a petition by residents of the area a few months ago.

• Instructed the County Engineer to start negotiations with Mr. Soullier at Milton Heights regarding the possible sale or relocation of his house, so that the road into Kelso Dam might be widened.

• Landscaping Costs: Instructed the Engineer to proceed with the clean up of the Eley property in Campbellville and to obtain estimates on the cost of landscaping the property.

• Accepted the tenders of Pete Mason of Georgetown for two half-ton pick up trucks at a cost of 2,767.68. The tender of Mason, Brothers of Guelph for the purchase of a dump truck at a cost of \$5,315.94 plus Federal and

Provincial Sales tax and the tender of J. Holland Motors of Burlington for a cab and chassis.

• Learned that locks have been installed in the former Jury Room in the south-west corner of the Court Room "A" so that exhibits could be placed for safe keeping during the luncheon recess. This was a recommendation of the Grand Jury.

• Approved the purchase of six locks to be installed at the County Jail from Chubb-Moyle and Taylor Sales Ltd. at a cost of \$878.95.

• Learned that the property committee will meet one-half hour early in July at the Old Court House and Administration Building on Brown St. The Committee will inspect Victoria Park and the area adjacent to the Jail House so they can give a firm recommendation on whether or not the park should be taken over by the town of Milton, and whether or not the property adjacent to the Jail House should be turned over to the Town of Milton for additional parking facilities near the arena.

• Thank Council: Received a letter of appreciation from the County of Ontario thanking the Warden and chairman of the property committee for arranging a recent luncheon that was provided.

• Agreed to advise the Oakville and district Association for Retarded Children that their request for a grant on a proposed extension to the Bruce Lyn School would have to be processed. Under a County by-law grants such as this are authorized at a rate of \$1.50 per square foot, which would mean a grant of \$1,647.

• Sailing Grant: Approved a \$300 grant to the Oakville Yacht Squadron for their Snipe Sailing Championship Regatta. Council made it clear the

resolutions and references to proper procedure, agreed to adjust the salary schedule for this group, effective in 1965.

A report to council from the Board of Health emphasized their concern that advertisements for replacements were not attracting applicants of the present salary schedule. "This is the time of year when nurses are usually available and if we to obtain replacements it must be immediately," the report stressed.

• Submit Schedule: The Board of Health submitted a salary schedule which they asked the county council to approve for 1965.

Chairman W. Leslie explained the Board expected 10 vacancies by September. Reeve C. A. Martin suggested he could appreciate the concern of the Board but wondered why the whole salary schedule should be considered when the emergency dealt primarily with the need for public health nurses.

The salary schedule introduced by the Board would raise the minimum for public health nurses from the present \$3,900 minimum to \$4,500 minimum in 1965.

• Break Our Back: Deputy Reeve F. Rogers, Burlington, claimed that if the council approved a salary schedule without referring it to the personnel committee first, it would be "breaking the back of the committee, particularly since we have just approved hiring a personnel consultant."

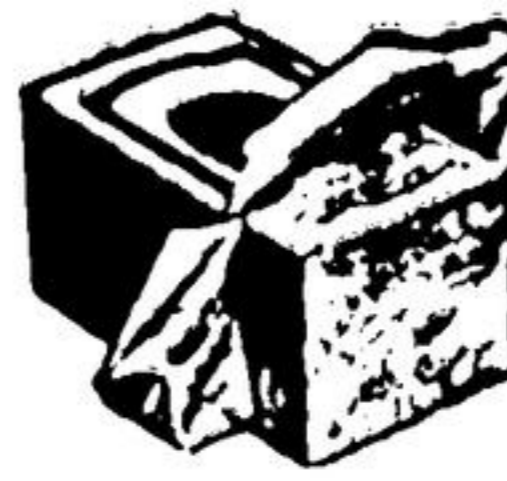

Watch Immigrants For Typhoid Fever

Halton County has reported no cases of typhoid fever since 1959. Dr. A. F. Bull, Halton Medical Officer of Health said this week.

However anyone coming into Halton from Scotland is being closely watched for the disease, following the fever outbreak in Aberdeen.

"We are advised of the arrival of these people by the Provincial Department of Health, and we will be following each one for a two week period to make certain that there is no evidence of illness resembling typhoid fever," Dr. Bull said.

Dr. Bull recalled in 1900 Ontario's typhoid death rate was 20 per 100,000, with a case rate of 70 per 100,000. In 1960, he added, there were only 22 Ontario cases and no deaths. He praised today's effective methods of treatment, and said Halton had five cases in 1950, one in 1951, one in 1956 and one in 1959.

County Firefighters Tour Gypsum Plant

Halton County Mutual Aid fire fighters — 80 strong — enjoyed a tour and a film at the Western Gypsum Products Ltd. plant, Clarkson, on Tuesday evening.

The firm were mainly interested in seeing the fire resistance of the gypsum and wallboard the firm makes. They saw it being fabricated and saw tests to prove its fire resistance, some boards holding back fire for one to four hours.
