The Oakville Oaks sprung loose for three runs in the first inning and added two more in the fifth as they strengthened their hold on first place last night (Wednesday) by downing the Campbellville Merchants 5-3 in a Halton County Intermediate League game in Oakville.

The front running Oaks capitalized on singles by Larry Curtis, two walks, a sacrifice fly and an error, as they scored three times in the first inning to overcome a one run Merchant lead. The Villagers had opened the scoring in the top of the inning as Al Wingrove walked, advanced to second on a ground out and scored on an error.

Two walks and a single by Earl Cairns in the third inning brought the Villagers to within one run of the Oaks, but that was as close as they ever got. In the fifth inning three consecutive singles loaded the bases with no one out, but Len Andrews' swingers were unable to chase across the tying run. In the bottom of the inning the Oaks scored twice on a well executed squeeze play to practically sew up the game. In the top of the sixth inning Larry McPhail gave Villager fans

a chance to cheer when he hit a long homer, but it came too late to do much good.

Harry Hamilton pitched five innings for Campbellville and allowed five runs on four hits, he struck out three and walked four. Jack Roberts fired the final inning, striking out two Oak hitters.

Al Wingrove had two singles and a walk for the Merchants. Larry McPhail homered, Stan Henderson walked and singled and Earl Cairns and Ken Moore each singled. Stu King, out with a broken jaw for two weeks, made his first appearance in the line-up since his injury, as a pinch hitter. Campbellville manager Andrews expects King will be in the starting line-up when Merchants host Dundas for a 2:30 game on Sunday.

Hotel Test Favors Doms

The softball circuit's two hotel entries tried to outdo each other as hosts in their first meeting of the current season, with the Station Hotel laying down the gauntlet by losing a 12-8 decision Tuesday night to downtown Dominion.

Last year, there wouldn't have been much of an argument from the north end hostelry, but this season it's a different story. Both clubs have shuffled their lineups and made a few changes, so they rank as contenders.

Four Run Lead
Tuesday, Dominion jumped into a four run first inning lead, which proved to be the winning margin when they counted the runs after nine innings.

Fred Thompson banged a single in the fourth inning which was followed by an error on Salmon's drive to right field and a sacrifice by Waterhouse followed by a double from Gary Masales played two additional runs.

The only players to catch a piece of Salmon's offerings were Howie Leader in the first frame and Ross Morton in the eighth.

Mohawk Sets Records

Records are only made to be broken at Mohawk Raceway.

Concluding the Wrought harness race meeting Saturday with 7,205 patrons in attendance, largest since opening, the Raceway handled \$6,182,789.00 over the distance, an average handle of \$171,744 per night. Compare that figure to the average handle of \$125,577 set in 1963 and it clearly illustrates the trend is ever upwards at Mohawk.

Total attendance was 133,295 for an average of 3,702, against 2,882 in 1963. And the average per capita wagering came to \$46.37. That's up \$2.81 over last year when \$43.56 was average.

Weather Co-operates
The weather cooperated by supplying 24 beautiful, clear country nights, eight cloudy and two very cool while only two nights of rain helped the muddlers.

Dune McTavish replaced Keith Waples as the leading driver with 15 wins while Ron Feagan, John Findley, Harold Wellwood, Bill Wellwood and Jack Herbert each collected 12 wins.

Horses in the fourth, fifth and sixth post positions posted the most wins with figures of 58, 55 and 50 respectively. Seven hundred and fifty eight horses competed with 175 drivers.

Pine Ridge Danny with five wins in eight starts was the leading pacer while another, Homestead Dan with seven wins in eight starts, paced the trotters.

Largest daily double was on June 5, 8 and 7. It totalled \$502.50 and some local people were in on the money. Largest Quintella was May 23, 4 and 5, \$398.50.

Two trotting records were broken. Ardee broke one June 12 when he did the mile in 2:02.3. Betsy Herbert smashed the 1 1/2 mile with a time of 2:47.3 on June 6. Dean Herbert broke two records for pacers doing the mile in 2:01.4 on May 30 and a mile and 1/2 in 2:54.4 on June 13.

The Province of Ontario's pari-mutuel wagering tax came to a whopping \$159,838.34, while the Dominion government had their fingers in the till for \$30,911.20.

Racing returns to Mohawk again in November in a bid to surpass the records already set.
