County Planning Association Embraces Halton Municipalities

A County Planning Association was formed this week, including representatives from planning boards and planning staffs within the county. It was reported to County Council Tuesday by Reeve H. Hinton.

Reeve Hinton explained the organization had nothing to do with the county council, although the county committee on planning had fostered its development. According to a resolution approved by representatives of planning boards and staffs from the county municipalities, membership in the group will be made up of one appointed by the municipality on recommendation of the planning board, and one from the planning staff, together with two members from county council.

Upgrade Planning
Advantage of the group, outlined in this paper at the conclusion of the meeting, would be for those responsible for planning to associate in an effort to upgrade planning generally, particularly between north and south municipalities. Membership in the group would be completely voluntary.

"Since 1961 I've been trying to get this initiated," Reeve Hinton told council. "It has the elements of a good basic organization."

Debate Tenders, Prices Two Esquering Additions

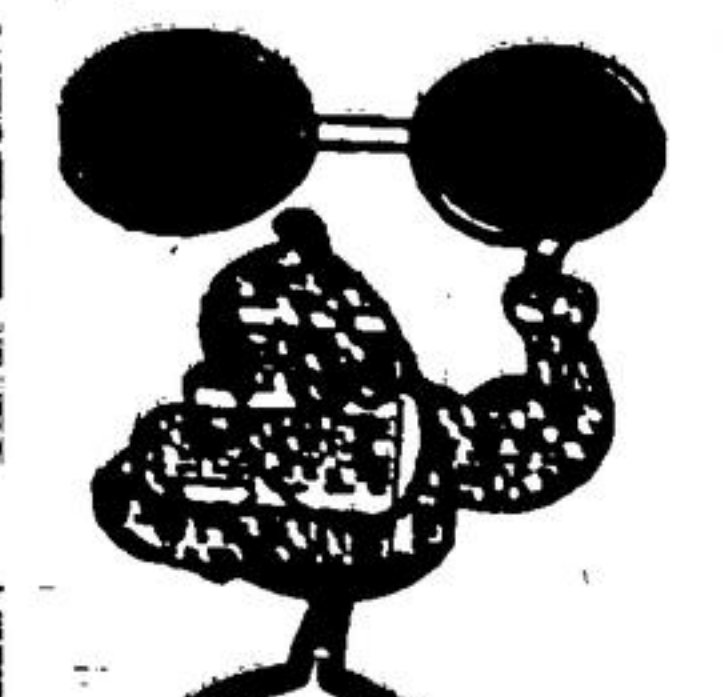
Esquering School Area Board received council's permission Monday to call tenders for three-room additions to the Glen Williams and Stewarttown Schools — an estimated \$152,000 expenditure.

However, councillors, following a lengthy debate with school board trustees, asked that the board delay letting a tender until prices are thoroughly studied. Architect H. Barnett discussed the building plans with council, and explained facilities were to be provided in the additions for future expansions as well.

Councillors wondered about the financing when only \$20,000 per room is granted by the Department of Education, and it was explained the facilities for additions would help up the cost.
