Over 350 Entries Compete In Style Acres Horse Show

The beautiful rolling hills and tricky obstacle courses made a perfect setting for the second annual horse show sponsored by Bruno Schivizzi at his Style Acres Ranch, north of Acton, Saturday, June 6.

Over 350 entries from all over Ontario, representing top riding stables, competed in the various contests throughout the day. An added feature this year was the competition for junior riders in the morning.

Ranch Trophy
Trucks and trailers began to arrive early in the morning for the first competition which began at 9:30 a.m. Top rider in the junior class was Wendy Marks of Hillsburgh, who copied the Style Acres Ranch trophy for total points for juniors participating in all classes.

Co-owners of the ranch, Bruno Schivizzi and Mrs. Evelyn Hathaway are both well known horsemen and during the summer months operate a school there for top handdressers in Canada and the United States. They also operate hand-dressing schools in Toronto and Hamilton.

Mr. Schivizzi has his own stable of riding horses and when he finds time, enjoys riding his course on one of his favorite horses. Both he and his partner officiated at the meet, with head judge David Humphries of Milton and Gordon Collins of Brampton as ring master. Mr. Schivizzi is a former Milton resident and operated a beauty salon in Milton at one time.

Plan Annual Promotion Fire Prevention Week

Fire Prevention Week in Halton County won't go unheeded this year — members of Halton Fire Prevention Bureau are already making plans to publicize the week and its safety message for everyone.

The special week falls from October 4 to 10 this year. Fire Prevention Week is always observed during the week of October 9th, the anniversary of the date of the Great Chicago Fire.

Parade, Blitz
New literature is on order, school drills and fire hall open houses are being planned, a one-day blitz of industrial and commercial buildings is being mapped out, and arrangements are being finalized for a church parade to mark the occasion.

The Halton Fire Prevention Bureau arranges Fire Prevention Week programs on a county basis and member departments in Oakville, Burlington, Georgetown,

Milton and Acton supplement the county program with their own demonstrations and special events.

New Literature
At their June meeting, the Bureau ordered over \$400 worth of new literature for distribution including school children's book-marks, restaurant place mats, and entry forms for the Grade Five fire prevention poster competition.

The blitz inspections will be carried out by Fire Department personnel and insurance company investigators in Acton and Georgetown during week of October 4 to 10, with Acton Fire Chief M. Holmes and Georgetown Chief Ery Lewis in charge. The two chiefs are also making plans for the annual church parade of Halton fire departments, to be held in one of the two towns during the same week.

New Chairman Fire Prevention

Burlington Fire Inspector Laurie Barkwell has been elected 1964 chairman of the Halton County Fire Prevention Bureau, following the resignation of chairman Bill Williams, an Acton firefighter.

In a letter of resignation, accepted with regret at the June meeting of the Bureau, chairman Williams explained that work on his job prevented him from continuing as chairman this year, as he would be unable to attend many of the meetings. He has been an active member of the Bureau for about six years.

Steps Up
Mr. Barkwell, who was elected vice-chairman in January, accepted the nomination to step up to the chairman's position for the remainder of the year. Oakville inspector Wes Miller was elected vice-chairman for the balance of 1964.

Other officers in the group come from Milton, Georgetown and Oakville, the other members of the county Fire Prevention Bureau.

Record \$1 Per Share Earnings For Union Gas Co. Shareholders

Record earnings of \$1.00 per share were reported recently by Union Gas Company of Canada, Limited, for the fiscal year ended March 31, 1964. Previous high was 93 cents per share, earned during the 1962-63 fiscal year.

In its annual report to shareholders, the Company notes volume of gas sales was up 5.9 per cent, to 52.9 billion cubic feet, and revenue from such sales rose 4.6 per cent, to \$50.8 million, up \$324,000 from the previous year.

Increase Customers
Consolidating the operations of Union Gas with those of its subsidiaries — Ontario Natural Gas Storage and Pipelines Limited, United Fuel Investments Limited and United Gas Limited — the report shows a 4.8 per cent increase in total customers, to 261,154, as of March 31, 1964. Because this past winter was about 7 per cent milder than the previous winter, residential gas consumption was down slightly (1.3 per cent) and the increase in commercial usage was less than the average annual rise over the previous five years. In contrast, industrial consumption was up 10 per cent.
